

- [10] This part of the brain stem connects the cerebral cortex with the medulla oblongata.

ANSWER: pons

[10] This is the largest of the brain's four lobes.

ANSWER: frontal lobe

[10] This portion of the frontal lobe controls the *production* of fluent speech.

ANSWER: Broca's area [do not prompt on "Wernicke's area"]

- 2 It is the largest of Japan's Volcano Islands. 10 points per answer.
- [10] Name this location of a February 1945 battle.

ANSWER: Iwo Jima

[20] A photograph of Marines planting a flag immortalizes the Battle of Iwo Jima. Name the mountain where this flag was placed, and the photographer who took the picture.

ANSWER: Mount Suribachi; Joseph "Joe" Rosenthal

- They contain a resistor, a capacitor, and an inductor. 10 points each.
- [10] Give the three-letter abbreviation for such circuits.

ANSWER: RLC circuits

[10] In this type of circuit, alpha, the Neper [NEH-pur] frequency is less than the resonant frequency, ω_{\circ} [omega sub zero].

ANSWER: overdamped circuit

[10] The graph of voltage versus time for an underdamped circuit has what shape?

ANSWER: <u>sinusoidal</u> or dampened <u>harmonic</u>

- 4 Name these British authors whose birthdays are celebrated today, 10 points each.
- [10] It's this Scot's 243rd birthday. His poetic lines include "Oh my love's like a red, red rose, that's newly sprung in June.

ANSWER: Robert (Rabbie) Burns

[10] This author of *The Razor's Edge* was born 127 years ago in Paris.

ANSWER: W(illiam) Somerset Maugham

[10] Born 120 years ago, in 1941, stressed after completing *Between the Acts* in 1941, she drowned herself in the River Ouse.

ANSWER: (Adeline) Virginia Woolf (née Stephen)

- Name these works by Christopher Marlowe, 10 points each.
- [10] Barabbas murders many and dies oddly, falling into a hot cauldron.

ANSWER: The **Jew of Malta**

[10] Thomas Nashe finished its opening scene, with Ganymede on Jupiter's knee.

ANSWER: The Tragedy of *Dido*, Queen of Carthage

[10] This epic 1598 poem tells of a pair of star-crossed lovers, one of whom is an excellent swimmer.

ANSWER: "Hero and Leander"

- 6 Name these Roman historians, 10 points each.
- [10] This son-in-law of Agricola wrote the Annals.

ANSWER: Cornelius Tacitus

[10] Once Hadrian's private secretary, he wrote Concerning the Lives of the Caesars and Concerning Illustrious Men.

ANSWER: Caius Suetonius Tranquillus [soo-uh-TOH-nee-us]

[10] This court historian of Valens, who wrote *A Brief History of Rome*, shares his name with the first eunuch ever appointed consul.

ANSWER: Flavius Eutropius

- 7 Name these baseball players who have the same names, 10 points each.
- [10] One had an 8-19 record for San Diego, while the other, a former Met, spent time with three of their affiliates.

ANSWER: Bobby Jones

[10] One spent his third season as a White Sox catcher, while the other primarily pinch hits for the Mets.

ANSWER: Mark Johnson

[10] One spent his second season with the Brewers after being an infielder for the Padres and Mets. The other made his major league début with Toronto.

ANSWER: Luis Lopez

- 8 Name these 18th century ministers, 15 points each.
- [15] He once stated, "The God that holds you over the pit of hell, much as one holds a spider or some loathsome insect over a fire, abhors you, and is dreadfully provoked."
 - ANSWER: Jonathan Edwards [prompt on "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God"]
- [15] Even Benjamin Franklin was moved by this revivalist, a leader of the Calvinistic Methodist Church, who disagreed with John Wesley over predestination.

ANSWER: George Whitefield

- 9 30-20-10. Name the musician from albums.
- [30] 2:00 AM Paradise Café and Showstoppers
- [20] Here at the Mayflower and Swing Street, Live on Broadway
- [10] If I Should Love Again and Even Now, Trying to Get That Feeling, and the song "Copacabana" ANSWER: Barry Manilow or Barry Alan Pincus
- 10 Many contain phycoerythrin, which captures light at great depths. 10 points each.
- [10] Name this phylum of algae, which includes the palmaria and polysiphonia, the commercial sources of carageenan and gel agar.
 - ANSWER: red algae or Rhodophyta
- [10] In the five-kingdom system, red algae belong to what kingdom?
 - ANSWER: **Protista** or **protist**(s)
- [10] Carageenan is specifically obtained from this moss, named for a country.
 - ANSWER: Irish moss or Chondrus crispus
- 11 Given the subtitle of a book by Randy Shilts, give the title, 10 points each.
- [10] "The Life and Times of Harvey Milk"
 - ANSWER: The Mayor of Castro Street
- [10] "Gays and Lesbians in the US Military"
 - ANSWER: Conduct Unbecoming
- [10] "Politics, People, and the AIDS Epidemic"
 - ANSWER: And the Band Played On
- 12 Given a compound, state whether it contains chlorine, fluorine, both, or neither, 10 points each.
- [10] Freon-12 ANSWER: <u>both</u>
- [10] Codeine ANSWER: neither
- [10] Prozac ANSWER: <u>fluorine</u> [fluoxetine]

- 13 Name these game shows hosted by Dick Clark, 10 points each.
- [10] This show's bonus round required giving nondescriptive lists for six categories in 60 seconds.

ANSWER: The \$25,000 Pyramid or The \$100,000 Pyramid

[10] Adapted from the UK, Clark hosted this short-lived 2000 show on CBS, in which one lucky contestant faced the "Wonderwall" for a chance at one million dollars.

ANSWER: Winning Lines

[10] This early 1990s show, a revival of *The Who, What, and Where Game,* emphasized current events and started with a 60-second "Sprint."

ANSWER: The Challengers

- 14 Name these musical terms, 10 points each.
- [10] This five-letter word describes a chord built on the first note of a scale.

ANSWER: tonic

[10] Moving from a dominant chord to a tonic is a "perfect" form of this progression of notes indicating the end of a section or work.

ANSWER: cadence or cadency or cadenza

[10] From the French for "word," the Franconian is one form of this type of work that often used a standard cadence form in the 1200s.

ANSWER: motet

- 15 Admired for translating Aristotle into Latin, his enemies conspired to have him executed. 10 points each.
- [10] Name this sixth-century philosopher, who wrote "For in every ill-turn of fortune the most unhappy sort of misfortune is to have been happy.".

ANSWER: Boethius Anicius Manlius Severinus

[10] While imprisoned, Boethius wrote this masterpiece referring to comfort or solace.

ANSWER: The <u>Consolation of Philosophy</u> or Consolatio Philosophiae

[10] Boethius's philosophy resembles this philosophy of Seneca and Marcus Aurelius.

ANSWER: Stoicism

- 16 In 1952, he employed the first air lift used in an underwater excavation. 10 points each.
- [10] Name this Frenchman exploring a Roman wreck off the coast of Marseilles.

ANSWER: Jacques(-Yves) Cousteau

[10] In 1956 and 1964, Cousteau won Oscars for his documentaries. Name either.

ANSWER: The Silent World or Le monde de silence or World Without Sun or Le monde sans soleil

[10] Cousteau's last documentary was on this "Stairway to the Sea."

ANSWER: St. Lawrence Seaway

- 17 Given an event from Mexican history, name the month in which it occurred, 10 points each.
- [10] Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla's [koh-STEE-yah] 1810 proclamation of independence, also called the "cry of Dolores"

ANSWER: September 16

[10] The birthday of Benito Pablo Juárez [HWAH-rez]

ANSWER: March 21

[10] The Battle of Puebla

ANSWER: May 5 [accept Cinco de Mayo]

- 18 In September 2001, a new US Representative to the UN was sworn in. 15 points each.
- [15] Name this man.

ANSWER: John D. Negroponte

[15] Negroponte's appointment was controversial, because he may have helped the Nicaraguan *contras* during his 1981 to 1985 term as US Ambassador to what nation?

ANSWER: Honduras

- 19 Name these movies due in 2002, 10 points each.
- [10] This prequel to *The Mummy* will feature Dwayne Johnson in the title role.

ANSWER: The Scorpion King

[10] The entire Romulan Senate will be murdered in this movie, aka Star Trek 10.

ANSWER: Star Trek: Nemesis

[10] The 2.0 [two-point-oh] sequel of this Steven Lisenberg film is set 20 years after the original. A hacker will transport himself into cyberspace.

ANSWER: <u>*Tron*</u> (2.0)

- 20 This religion's first written record is the *Kojiki*, or records of ancient matters, completed in AD 712.
- [5] Name this religion of Japan.

ANSWER: Shintoism

[10] This name is given to the decorative portal used to enter Shinto temples.

ANSWER: torii

[15] Junichiro Koizumi visited this shrine dedicated to Japan's war dead, angering its Asian neighbors.

ANSWER: Yasukuni Jinja Shrine

- 21 These March 1802 accords brought a respite to the Napoleonic wars. 15 points each.
- [15] Name this Peace broken by the British just one year later.

ANSWER: Peace or Treaty of Amiens [AH-mee-enz]

[15] In 1802, Napoleon also sent troops to Hispaniola to subdue this man.

ANSWER: Toussaint L'Ouverture [loo-vare-TOOR] François Dominique

- Pulsating with a period of one hour to several weeks, Fabricius discovered the first one, Mira, in 1596. 10 points each.
- [10] Name these stars of variable intensity.

ANSWER: Cepheid [SEH-fay-id] variables

[10] What astronomer used Cepheid variables to calculate distances between galaxies in an attempt to measure the age of the Universe?

ANSWER: Edwin Hubble

[10] Hubble's original, erroneous value for the age of the Universe was, rounded to the nearest billion, how many vears?

ANSWER: 2 billion years

ANSWER: Romulus

ANSWER: Faustulus

[10] This god fathered Romulus with Rhea Silvia.

ANSWER: Mars

- 25 Name these Salvador Dalí works, 15 points each.
- On the left is a dog; in the center, a face-like object is supported by stick-like pitchforks. The face is elongated in the back, and its eyes are closed.

ANSWER: Sleep

[15] Our Lady of Fatima appears on the right, while more prominent are several pitchforks pointing towards the center of a red-dominated lower left.

ANSWER: Vision of Hell

[10] Haley chronicles his travels to this West African country to learn the history of the Kinte family.

ANSWER: The Gambia

- 27 Given a phrase, name the *specific* Article or Amendment of the US Constitution that so states, 10 points each.
- [10] "The ratification of the conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution."

ANSWER: Article VII [7]

[10] "The terms of the President and Vice-President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January".

ANSWER: Amendment XX [20]

[10] "Full faith and credit shall be given in each State to the public acts, records, and judicial proceeding of every other State."

ANSWER: Article IV [4]
