

## Toss Up 6

1. Two Popes, an admiral, a bassist, and one half of the Beatles. FTP say two words.

Answer: John Paul

2. His 60 volumes of writing were considered to be a "symbolist manifesto." An 1892 work of his eventually inspired a Debussy opera in 1902. He kept a natural theme through his titles, with such works translated as *The Blue Bird*, 1909 and the *Life of the Bee* 1901. For 10 points, name this Belgian author who wrote in French whose symbolist-inspired works helped him to win the 1911 Nobel Prize in Literature.

Answer: Maurice Maeterlinck

3. One of the stipulations of the transportation equity act put on the congressional agenda of May 1998 was a requirement that states would have to adopt this figure for declaring someone legally drunk or risk losing 10% of their federal highway dollars. For 10 points, what common blood alcohol level plateau is this, one already adopted by many states who thought that .10 was too high.

Answer: .08 or .08%

4. The Samina River, which flows near Triesenberg is one of this nation's most vital waterways. Gamprin & Rugell are the largest towns along the railroad that goes along the Rhine toward the capital of Vaduz. FTP, name this tiny principality.

Answer: Liechtenstein

5. Normally, it is shown when a spectral line splits into two with a strong magnetic field applied parallel to the light path. The light can also split into three if the magnetic field is perpendicular. However, in general, atoms show the anomalous version of this effect where spectra split in several closely spaced lines. For 10 points, name this effect, which won its Dutch physicist namesake one-half of the 1902 Nobel Prize in Physics.

Answer: The Zeeman Effect

6. At the age of two he was kidnapped from his parents in Naples, Italy and ransomed for 25 pounds which inspired kidnapping episodes in his operettas *The Gondoliers* and *The Pirates of Penzance*. For 10 points, name this collaborator of Arthur Sullivan.

Answer: William Schwenck Gilbert

7. Secretary Evelyn Lincoln was clearing off some papers from Air Force One when she found a handwritten note saying "I know that there is a God and I see a storm coming. If he has a place for me, I am ready." For 10 points, what president wrote that note, part of 60,000 pages of documents released to the public in 1998 – a note that possibly forecasted his own November 22, 1963 assassination?

Answer: John F. Kennedy or JFK

8. Paper and Pencil Ready. You have just received a \$50 savings bond that matured today. You decide to hold onto it as it will yield 10% interest per quarter. But after 2 quarters, you have to sell it to help pay for your Judge buzzer system. For 10 points, exactly how much money did you get for selling that bond?

Answer: \$ 60.50

9. It was condemned as pornography in 1856 and the author was so disgusted with the censure that he claimed that he wished he had enough money to buy up every copy and throw them all into the fire and never hear of Charles and Emma again. For 10 points, name this work by Gustave Flaubert.

Answer: Madame Bovary

10. God promised Abraham that this city would be saved if there were 10 good men in it. There weren't, & this city was set aflame for its wickedness. FTP, name this city associated with Gomorroah.

Answer: Sodom

11. He was the father of Hesperides and the uncle of the daughters of Hesperus. When Hercules was sent to retrieve the apples of Hesperides, he asked him to get them for Hercules. In return, Hercules would trade places with him during the duration of his quest. FTP, who was this Titan who almost escaped holding up the heavens?

Answer: Atlas

12. She didn't even live to be 40 and in fact she was dominated by ill health for the last 17 years of her life and had to be supervised. What left the world too soon was a woman who could translate Italian, teach herself geometry, understand symbolic logic and most of all, understand the principles of the programmed computer. For 10 points, name this companion to Charles Babbage and daughter of a famous poet.

Answer: Ada Lovelace or Ada Byron Lovelace

13. The first 22 executions were carried out in 1998 for those convicted of instigating a 1994 genocide in which half a million people were killed in -- for 10 points -- what African nation?

Answer: Rwanda

14. It was not signed because the King granting it could not write his name. So -- he put his seal on it instead. For 10 points what was this document, "sealed" by King John in 1215?

Answer: Magna Carta

15. Perhaps she should be singing "Unbreak my Checking Account" or "You mean a Tax Break to Me" because hey, this singer is broke! For 10 points, name this bankrupt chanteuse of the real song, "Unbreak My Heart."

Answer: Toni Braxton

16. Founded by Lou Conte, this dance company began in 1977 with four women who would perform at senior citizens's homes. For the troupe's final number, a top hat and cane would be thrown on stage, launching what has become the group's signature piece, "The 40s." The company now boasts 20 members, a repertoire including pieces by Twyla Tharp, and a new rehearsal space in their home city of Chicago. FTP, name this company which takes its name from a Chicago location.

Answer: Hubbard Street Dance Company

17. The ironies in his most famous volume were twofold. First, he published the work when he was 41, long after he had grown out of adolescence. Secondly, he was born in Fockbury county, not in the county that the title would indicate. For 10 points ~~a piece~~, name the English author of the 1896 volume of poetry entitled *A Shropshire Lad*.

Answer: A.E. Housman

18. The decision in this 1966 case, written by Chief Justice Warren, extended and defined the decisions in *Gideon v. Wainwright* and *Escobedo v. Illinois*. It reversed the convictions of a Phoenix warehouse worker on charges of rape and kidnapping. FTP name this Supreme Court case which requires suspects to have their rights read to them before questioning.

Answer: Miranda v. Arizona

19. It is served by a nineteen-mile long road that rises most of its 14,110 feet. From its summit, one can see the Continental Divide, Sangre De Cristo Mountains, New Mexico, Denver, and Colorado Springs. FTP, name this Western mountain named for the American explorer who unsuccessfully attempted to climb it.

Answer: Pike's Peak

20. The name of this animal was the Malay term for the *isavagei* people of the Sunda Islands and means verbally *iman* of the woods. An anthropoid ape found in the swampy forests of Borneo and Sumatra, it has the brain most similar to that of humans. It differs from its relatives the gorilla and the chimpanzee in that the nose is broad and flattened, the upper lip long and broad, and the arms extremely long. FTP name this ape whose name is not derived from the color of its coat of long sparse hair.

Answer: Orangutan

21. Shavings of this substance are burned to make Spanish black, a paint used by artists and its powder is mixed with linseed oil and spread over canvas or burlap to make linoleum. Portugal, Spain and Algeria are the top three producers of this substance as the live oak trees on which it grows are primarily found there. For 10 points, name this lightweight, spongy substance.

Answer: Cork

22. In 1831, the following words appeared in print "On this subject I do not wish to think, or speak, or write with moderation...I am in earnest -- I will not equivocate -- I will not excuse -- I will not retreat a single inch -- AND I WILL BE HEARD." For 10 points, this was part of what abolitionist journal written by William Lloyd Garrison?

Answer: The Liberator (Prompt on William Lloyd Garrison)

23. Adios! With a 61% of voters in the majority, this state has chosen to eliminate its bilingual education system in 1998. For 10 points, what is this state, a virtual factory of propositions just like Proposition 227 that would end the comfort of most Spanish speakers in San Diego and Los Angeles.

Answer: California

24. In 1949, 16-year old John Grady Cole and his friend Lucy Rawlins saddle their horses and intend to ride south away from San Angelo, Texas. When they arrive in Mexico, they earn a living breaking horses on a ranch but are eventually thrown in jail accused of murder. Eventually, Cole and Rawlins escape from jail and split up whereupon Rawlins returns to Texas and Cole stays in Mexico. So goes, for 10 points, what 1992 Novel by Cormac McCarthy?

Answer: All The Pretty Horses
