1) You may not have gotten the day off from school, but October 3, 1998, was the tenth anniversary of a holiday set aside for this type of watery ecosystem. They come in all shapes and sizes, and include bays, marshes, swamps, lagoons, harbors, inlets, and sounds. FTP what are these meeting places of the river and the sea which are protected from the full force of ocean waves, winds, and storms by reefs, barrier islands, or fingers of land?

2) Today marks the 99th anniversary of his birth, though he missed seeing it by 25 years. Educated in England as a lawyer, he returned to his native India and in 1929 became president of the Indian National Congress. His friendship with Gandhi suffered when he favored war with Muslim separatists during the partition of Pakistan. FTP name this man who became India's first prime minister in 1947.

A. Jawaharlal Nehru

3) One was the wife of Zebedee and mother of the apostles James the Great and John the Evangelist. The other was the granddaughter of Herod the Great. The latter was the subject of a tone poem by Richard Strauss, a drama by Oscar Wilde, and drawings by Aubrey Beardsley. FTP give the common name of these women, the more famous of which is infamous for demanding the head of John the Baptist.

A. Salome

4) They were born about a year apart in 1795 and 1796 in central Germany. Both became interested in literary research at early ages, and they worked together to preserve the foundations of the German folk tales they had heard as boys. FTP name these brothers famous for collecting stories such as "sleeping beauty" and "little red riding hood."

A. Grimm brothers (Jacob and Wilhelm)

5) In October, 1997, there was much concern about the NASA probe Cassini since many felt its 72 pounds of plutonium fuel could kill millions if it malfunctioned within Earth orbit. The probe's target, FTP, was what planet whose rings' divisions share their name with the probe?

A. Saturn (if one rings in early with "Titan", accept it, but not after you've read "planet")

6) This scientist's grandfather, Erasmus, was an 18th century British physiologist and poet who wrote Zoonomia, which anticipated some of the evolutionary theories of Jean Baptiste Lamarck. This is ironic, since this scientist's best known works invalidated most of Lamarck's theories. FTP who is this naturalist known for his sojourn on The Beagle?

A. Charles Darwin

7) With his mistress he fathered five children, all of whom he immediately delivered to the foundling hospital. Ironic behavior for a man often partially credited with originating the Romantic sensibility. Who was this French proponent of “the noble savage” and, FTP, author of the Social Contract?

A. Jean Jacques Rousseau

8) One of his earliest roles was as a runaway on the forgettable sitcom “Growing Pains.” He later gained critical acclaim playing the mildly retarded brother of Johnny Depp’s character in What’s Eating Gilbert Grape? FTP name this currently hot young star who really broke through with his role in Titanic.

A. Leonardo DiCaprio

9) After a Spanish extradition request, he was arrested in London on October 17 of this year. The Spanish charge him with crimes against humanity during his military regime which lasted from 1974-1990. FTP who is this former Chilean dictator?

A. Augusto Pinochet Ugarte

10) They included the following: freedom of the seas, general disarmament, abolition of trade barriers, settlement of colonial claims, evacuation of conquered Russian territories, readjustment of Italian borders, autonomy for the peoples of Austria and Hungary, and the return of the Alsace-Lorraine to France. FTP, what numerical name was given to these U. S. post World War I objectives framed by Woodrow Wilson?

13) The subject is a group of prostitutes from a Barcelona brothel. Their representation, however, is fragmented, and the two faces on the right bear an especially striking resemblance to the African masks which fascinated its painter. FTP name this Picasso painting which is generally considered to be the first truly cubist work.

A. Les Demoiselles d’Avignon (The Ladies of Avignon--be lenient with pronunciations)

14) Much has been made of Jim Carrey’s recent attempts to become the character he plays in

an upcoming movie biography. He went so far as to spit on former pro wrestler Jerry Lawler, so Lawler would drop Carrey on his head, just as Lawler did to the comedian Carrey is playing. FTP, name the deceased comedian Carrey plays in the upcoming film Man on the Moon, best known for wrestling women and playing Latka Gravas on the sitcom Taxi.

A. Andy Kaufman

15) If caused by a virus, it is not contagious and rarely fatal, but if it's caused by bacteria, it's very dangerous. Oddly, the very bacteria which cause this disease live harmlessly in the nose and throat of many people, only becoming dangerous if somehow activated. FTP name this disease which infects the protective membrane covering the brain and spinal cord.

16) This composer's most fertile creative periods coincided with his chronic bouts of depression, which first began in 1877, around the time he finished his fourth symphony. His sixth symphony expanded his fame throughout Europe and into America, and his ballet Sleeping Beauty solidified it. FTP name this composer whose sixth symphony is nicknamed "Pathétique," and who also composed the ballets Swan Lake and The Nutcracker.

A. Pyotr Tchaikovsky

17) He was born on November 14, 1765, and he quickly took an interest in the improvement of ships, especially in warfare. To this end he invented the first workable torpedo. FTP, name this nautical inventor who built a submarine, the Nautilus, and the first commercially successful steamship, the Clermont.

A. Robert Fulton

18) Its name comes from the fact that, just by looking at it, one can tell if a particular kind of equation has distinct real roots, a repeated real root, or a pair of complex conjugate roots. FTP name this quantity,  $b^2-4ac$ .

A. discriminant

19) He is fated to fight the Midgard Serpent in a battle to the death at Ragnarok. His favored weapon is Mjolnir (zhol-nur), a hammer. FTP name this Norse god of thunder.

A. Thor

20) As a black man and a homosexual, he felt doubly discriminated against in the United States, so he left for Paris in 1948. There he wrote, among other works, Giovanni's Room, a novel dealing with homosexuality, and The Fire Next Time, a series of letters to a nephew. FTP name this author of the more well known novel Go Tell It on the Mountain.

A. James Baldwin

21) A Scottish missionary doctor, he worked mainly in Africa. He explored the Zambezi River and was the first Westerner to see Victoria Falls, which he named. FTP name this doctor, whom I presume you know best from his meeting with Henry Stanley.

A. David Livingstone
