A. Beanie Babies

1. His music is celebrated yearly at a festival in South Carolina called Spoleto. A composer, he tried to marry modern subject matter with classical musical structures, as in The Saint of Bleeker Street. FTP, name this composer of the first made-for-television opera, Amahl and the Night Visitors.

A. Gian-Carlo Menotti

1. He died on September 13, 1998, 26 years after he survived an assassin's bullet in Laurel, Maryland. FTP name this former presidential candidate and segregationist governor of Alabama.

A. George Wallace

1. He served as the American Minister to Spain from 1842 to 1846 and published a five-volume biography of George Washington in 1858, which he published under his own name in 1858. Earlier he had published The Alhambra and The Sketch Book under the name Geoffrey Crayon. FTP name this author who published a farcical history of New York under the pseudonym Diedrich Knickerbocker.

A. Washington Irving

1. Some are tiny and relay signals over distances as short as one millimeter. Others Among the longest cells in the human body. They can transmit impulses as fast as 130 meters per second. FTP name these cells made up of a cell body, dendrites, and axons.

A. neurons

1. How many ways can a committee of three people be formed from a group of seven if all members are equal?

1. Contrary to popular reckoning, he used a metronome in his conditioning experiments, not a bell. FTP, name this forerunner of B. F. Skinner who is best remembered for making dogs drool by associating feedings with sounds.

A. Ivan Pavlov

1. She lived in the early sixth century B. C., daughter of an aristocratic Greek family, and led a cult of Aphrodite on the island of Lesbos. FTP, name this poetess sometimes referred to as the “female Homer.”

A. Sappho

1. In 1169 he took control of Egypt by capturing Cairo. There he built the Citadel, a large military barracks with high walls to fortify the city. Next this Kurdish sultan called for a jihad, or holy war, against the Christians who had occupied Jerusalem. FTP who was this man who provoked the third crusade?

A. Saladin

1. They can be classified as either extrusive or intrusive, depending on whether they are formed on the surface of the Earth or below. FTP, name this category of rock whose divisions can also be called volcanic or plutonic.

A. igneous rocks

1. For a quick ten points, carry out the following command: ponga su mano derecha en su cabeza.

1. Her name is Alisoun, though the title of her tale doesn't use her name. Her story recounts the quest of an Arthurian knight who has raped a young maiden and for penance must find out what women most desire. Unfortunately for him the correct answer is given by an ugly old woman whom he must then marry. FTP name this Chaucerian tale spinner whose title as “wife” may have more to do with being a weaver than being married.

A. the Wife of Bath

1. Its earliest known ancestor is the Hyracotherium (hi-rak-o-theer-ee-um), a dog-sized quadruped of the Eocene epoch. Intermediate species in its evolutionary chain include Eohippus and Pliohippus. FTP name this friend of man of the genus Equus.

A. horse

1. He was born in Georgia around 1800, the son of a British trader and a Native American woman. As a tribal leader, he vigorously opposed forced westward migration for his people, which led to his eventual seizure by the U.S. military in 1837 even though he appeared under a flag of truce. He was imprisoned in St. Augustine for a time, though he died in Fort Moultrie in South Carolina. FTP, name this Native American leader whose namesake throws a flaming spear into the turf at Doak Campbell stadium on Saturdays in the Fall.

A. Chief Osceola

1. It is the first name of the main character of Jerzy Kosinski's Being There. The adjective "aleatory" refers to decisions made using it. FTP, what is this word, which means the same thing whether preceded by "slim" or "fat"?

A. chance

1. About the only thing critics agree upon is that this art movement is difficult to accurately define. Artists in this early style tried to fuse architecture, sculpture, and painting into a single "truth," as did one of its major proponents, Gianlorenzo (jon-lo-ren-zo) Bernini. FTP name this movement whose name can be defined as "excessive" or "ornate."

A. Baroque

- 17) The Bible, as most Americans know, is divided into books. The Koran, however, is divided into 114 of these, a four-letter term which is the same as the last name of a back-up point guard for the Cleveland Cavaliers out of Florida State. FTP, give the common term.

A. sura (Bobby Sura is the player)

- 18) For Great Britain, the situation in 1940 was desperate. France had fallen to the Nazis, and British demand for war materiel far outstripped its capability to produce it. Due to disruptions in Atlantic shipping, buying arms was also difficult. Still, Winston Churchill turned to President Roosevelt for help and got it. FTP, name the January, 1941, agreement under which Roosevelt assumed the powers necessary to send war supplies to Great Britain.
