

## Round 2 - Tossups

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1. In one belligerent, the post-war reaction was expressed in the National Revolutionary Movement, which ultimately brought about the revolution of 1952, while in the other it produced the reformist Febrerista party. The treaty ending it was signed at Buenos Aires, and granted one-quarter of the disputed territory and an outlet on the Pilcomaya River to Bolivia. FTP, name this 1932-35 conflict between Paraguay and Bolivia, named for the region under dispute.

Answer: Gran Chaco War

2. This painting, one of the first the artist created after his *Andromache by the Body of Hector* won him admission to the Academy, has a there of noble gesture -- a father's willingness to sacrifice his three sons for the good of the republic. The work's titular characters are seen swearing on their swords - a modern allegory in Roman dress which Parisians quickly picked up on. FTP, name this 1784-85 Jacques-Louis David work, in which overtones of the French Revolution are seen.

Answer: *The Oath of the Horatii*

3. The novel reflects the author's preoccupation with the military structure that worked so well during the Civil War, as all citizens are drafted into the national economy at age 21 and discharged at 45. It begins as Dr. Pillsbury, a hypnotist, enters a subterranean chamber to relieve the insomnia of the protagonist, Julian West. FTP, name this 1888 novel about a futurist utopia, written by Edward Bellamy.

Answer: *Looking Backward*

4. The petitioner, when hauled into a Florida circuit court for breaking into Panama City's Bay Harbor Poolroom, already had a long rap sheet and thus plenty of courtroom experience. Yet, the Supreme Court overturned *Betts v. Brady* in this decision, granting the petitioner's motion to proceed *in forma pauperis* and petition for a writ of *certiorari*. FTP, name this 1963 Supreme Court case, which guarantees court-appointed attorneys for the indigent.

Answer: *Gideon v. Wainwright*

5. It was formed at a meeting that was itself a response to events in Springfield, Illinois the previous year, and by the end of its first decade had displaced the Niagara Movement. It conceded the task of improving economic opportunity and providing social services to the National Urban League, but by its 85th anniversary in 1994, criticism was focused on its 3.5 million dollar deficit and the leadership of Benjamin Chavis. FTP, name this organization, founded in New York City in 1909, America's predominant civil rights group.

Answer: National Association for the Advancement of Colored People

6. In the early 1510s he accompanied the soldiers of Glarus as their chaplain when they fought in northern Italy in the service of the pope against the French. The government of his country oversaw two "disputations" or public discussions in 1523 in which theologians and churchmen tested the truth of his teachings, which he had put forward in 67 *Schlussreden*, or proofs. FTP, name this first Protestant reformer of Switzerland, associated with Zurich.

Answer: Ulrich Zwingli

7. This gas is always present at ground level at nonhazardous concentrations, but pollution such as smog can raise it to several hundred molecules per billion air molecules. It is generally produced when shortwave solar radiation strikes another isotope of the same element, causing the two molecules to separate and recombine with other, nonseparated molecules of the element. FTP, name this gas with molecular structure O<sub>3</sub>.

Answer: Ozone

8. Thomas Fowler, a seasoned foreign correspondent, observes at one point in the novel: "I never knew a man who had better motives for all the trouble he caused". Yet, by the novel's end, Fowler becomes an accomplice in the death of Alden Pyle, the "Economic Attache" who represents America's single-minded idealism in opposition to Communism. FTP, name this 1955 novel about a fumbling idealist in cold-war Indochina, written by Graham Greene.

Answer: *The Quiet American*

9. Today one of the most important uses of the raw form of this mineral is to keep portland cement from drying too quickly, although it was used on soils that lacked lime before being eclipsed by ground limestone and prepared fertilizers. With chemical formula  $\text{CaSO}_4 \cdot 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$ , it sometimes can be found in transparent crystals called selenite. FTP, name this yellowish-white mineral used to make plaster of Paris.

Answer: Gypsum

10. It was issued following the outbreak of Pontiac's War, and was first modified by the Treaty of Hard Labor and the First Treaty of Fort Stanwix. It provided land grants to British veterans of the war with the French in America, and established a reservation in the territory south of that of the Hudson's Bay Company. FTP, name this royal decree issued by George III forbidding European settlement west of the Appalachians.

Answer: Proclamation of 1763

11. Born in Hamburg in 1833, while on a recital tour in 1853 he met the great violinist Joseph Joachim who introduced him to many leading musicians of the day. His most popular works include two piano concertos: *Concerto for Violin and Orchestra* and *Hungarian Dances* as well as the famous *Wiegenlied* or *Lullaby*. FTP, name this great German composer of lieder and "good friend" of Robert and Clara Schumann.

Answer: Johannes Brahms

12. His great-grandfather wrote a popular 1880 romance called *The White Rose of Memphis* and his violent death in 1889 provided his great-grandson with literary material. With the help of Sherwood Anderson, he published his first novel, *Soldier's Pay*, in 1926, two years after the publication of his first book of verse -- *The Marble Faun*. FTP, name this 1949 Nobel Prize winner for Literature and creator of Yoknapatawpha County.

Answer: William Faulkner

13. A 37-year-old delegate to the 1948 Democratic National Convention, his stirring oratory persuaded the body to override the platform committee and include Truman's civil rights proposals. His first legislative proposal in the Senate was later enacted as Medicare, and he served there from 1948 to 1964 and again from 1970 until his death in 1978. FTP, name this politician, who helped bring about the merger of the Farmer-Labor Party with the Democratic Party in Minnesota and was vice president under Lyndon Johnson.

Answer: Hubert Horatio Humphrey

14. Its deed of gift was altered in 1958 after a 21-year lapse in competition to drop the requirement of sailing across the ocean. The first winner of it was seized by the Confederates during the Civil War and used it as a blockade runner. FTP, name this yachting trophy, usually competed for every three years.

Answer: America's Cup

15. They claimed to teach easy ways to success and money-making, and the technique of arguing on any point without regard for morality or truth. Unscrupulous ones such as Thrasymachus ruined the reputation of more famous ones such as Protagoras and Gorgias of Leontini in Sicily. FTP, name these professional, usually itinerant ancient Greek teachers, condemned by Socrates for their methods and their practice of accepting money for teaching.

Answer: Sophists

16. Milky Blue, Destroying Angel, Russula, Chestnut, Beefsteak, and Jack O'Lantern are all varieties of this plant. The main part of the plant, called the mycelium, is located underground, while the umbrella growth above ground merely distributes spores. FTP, name this fungus which also includes the puffball and morel.

Answers: Mushroom or Toadstool

17. Ellen Thatcher Ogelthorpe is a successful actress but loses the man she loves and is unable to find happiness. Joe Harland, a Wall Street gambler, loses his fortune and becomes a beggar. The novel presents a picture of life in New York City during the 1920s through the simultaneous stories of several people from different levels of society. FTP, name this 1925 Dos Passos work, whose name is taken from a railroad station.

Answer: Manhattan Transfer

18. It's chemical formula is  $(ClC_6H_4)_2 C_4Cl_3$  and is manufactured from chloral and chlorobenzene. Used heavily in the Mid- and South-Pacific theaters during World War II, studies later began to show its widespread damage to birds, especially the eggs of bald eagle. FTP, name this insecticide which the Environmental Protection Agency banned in 1972.

Answer: Dichloro - diphenyl - trichloroethane

19. The oracle double-crossed him when it said that if he fought the Persians he would bring down a mighty empire, as it became clear to him after the event that the empire was his own. He called on Solon's name as a sacrificial pyre was lit, and so was pardoned by Cyrus the Elder and became a friend and adviser to him. FTP, name this last king of Lydia, famous in the ancient world for his proverbial wealth.

Answer: Croesus

20. He is known for his three-volume semiautobiography under the collective title *The Memoirs of George Sherston* whose first volume, *Memoirs of a Fox-Hunting Man* is a vivid recounting of life before World War I. His volume *Counter-Attack and Other Poems* contains angry, violent, and satirical poems concerning World War I. FTP, name this Englishman who wrote a public letter in 1917 condemning World War I, which was downplayed by Robert Graves.

Answer: Siegfried Sassoon

21. It is treated with colchicine, an alkaloid drug derived from the autumn crocus, and drug treatment should be supported by a diet devoid of foods rich in purines. The disease is due to abnormally high uric acid content of the blood, caused by a high level of excretion of that acid by the body. FTP, name this congenital disease, generally found in men over the age of 40, which inflamed and swells the affected joints.

Answer: Gout

3. Answer these questions about Hinduism FTP each.

A. This is the name of the most absolute, abstract form of god -- the divine force that sustains the universe.

Answer: Brahman

B. Brahman has three main forms, collectively called the Trimurti. All or nothing, name all three members of this group.

Answers: Brahma, Vishnu, Shiva ✓

C. This group of sacred writings, last of the Vedas, glorify Brahman over all the other forms of God.

Answer: Upanishads or Vedantas

C. The Peace of Westphalia recognized the sovereignty of the German states. The sovereignty of two other regions was also recognized - name them both 5 for one and 15 for both.

Answers: Netherlands (grudgingly accept Holland) and Swiss Confederation or Switzerland

Answer: Beyond the Horizon

C. In this 1920 play, the scene is an island in the West Indies and the titular character is a former Pullman porter.

Answer: The Emperor Jones

10. Given a description of a character in the saga of the Banks of the United States, name him FTSNOP.

A. FFP, the proposal for a Congressionally chartered bank was put forward in his December 13, 1790 Report on a National Bank.

Answer: Alexander Hamilton ✓

B. FTP, this man served as president of the Second Bank of the United States from 1823-36, thus ensuring a confrontation with Andrew Jackson.

Answer: Nicholas Biddle

C. On September 10, 1833 President Jackson ordered all Treasury funds to be withdrawn from the bank. Jackson's Treasury Secretary refused, and an enraged Jackson sacked and swallowed him whole. 5 for one, 15 for both, name both that Treasury Secretary and his replacement.

Answers: William Duane, Roger Taney ✓

11. Given a brief description of a legal term (no pun intended), name the term FTP each.

A. This is a pretrial process that enable one side in a litigation to elicit information from the other side relating to facts in the case.

Answer: Discovery

Answer: kilogram times meter<sup>-1</sup> times second<sup>-2</sup>
