**1** Though some believe that it may not begin until the 22<sup>nd</sup> century, some people believe it began on 23 January 1997, when astrology charts formed a nearly perfect Star of David. A time when "peace will guide the planets and love will steer the stars"—for 10 points--name this era that will begin "when the moon is in the seventh house, and Jupiter aligns with Mars."

ANSWER: The Dawning of the Age of Aquarius

**2** A car chase from a restaurant to the family's home. An electrical fire destroys a hand-carved wedding present. A volleyball game in which one person breaks another's nose. A toilet-trained cat and its imposter. A polygraph test given by a father to his daughter's fiancé. All of these appear in--for 10 points--what 2000 movie starring Robert DeNiro and Ben Stiller?

ANSWER: Meet the Parents

**3** Born in Furth, Germany, he published the academic journal *Confluence*, and from 1943 to 1946 served in the US Army, primarily as part of the occupational government of Germany. His first book was *Nuclear Weapons and Foreign Policy*, published in 1957. A consultant for Eisenhower, Johnson, and Kennedy on foreign policy--for 10 points--name this man, Nixon's National Security Advisor and later Secretary of State.

ANSWER: Henry Alfred Kissinger

**4** X-rays or gamma rays, operating as photons, transfer some energy and momentum to a loosely bound electron. Since the rays' energy and momentum are proportional to their frequency, the photon has a longer wavelength after the collision. The exact value of the wavelength, though, depends on the angle between the incident rays and target material. For 10 points--name this effect, discovered in 1923, that is predicted by quantum mechanics.

ANSWER: Compton effect

**5** He had early roles in *Oedipus Rex*, *The Brothers Karamazov*, and a TV version of *The Scarlet Pimpernel*. This Québécois played Paul Revere in the 1978 film *The Bastard*, Joseph Conrad in an episode of *Mission: Impossible*, and the protagonist in *Incubus*. More recently, he has been a Big Giant Head. For 10 points--name this man, who will soon stop gracing Priceline ads, best known for playing Captain [pause] James [pause] T. [pause] Kirk.

ANSWER: William Shatner

**6** Among his works are *Pharmacy*, a landscape painted by another artist, to which he added a green and red patch, and *Ready-Mades*, a series of everyday objects that he signed and gave unrelated titles. The works, as well as *The Chess Players* and *Nude Descending a Staircase* show contempt for the bourgeois idea of art by--for 10 points--which Dadaist?

ANSWER: Marcel Duchamp

**7** Best-known for a mis-reading of one of his titles, this author, who believed that printed books would become obsolete, wrote such books as *The Mechanical Bride* and *City as Classroom*. He coined the term "global village," and wrote *Understanding Media: The Extensions of Man*. For 10 points--name this man, who must be thrilled that people have garbled the title of his book *The Medium is the Massage*.

ANSWER: (Herbert) Marshall McLuhan

**8** She trained as an architect in New Delhi before she began writing screenplays, her most successful feature being the film *Electric Moon*. She went on to make publishing history by receiving £500,000 in advances by 18 publishers worldwide for her first novel, which won the Booker Prize in 1997. For 10 points--name this author of *The God of Small Things*.

ANSWER: Arundhati **Roy**

**9** Darboux's [dar-BOO] version of these objects exists if the difference between upper and lower sums tends to zero as the partition's mesh size decreases. Lebesgue [le-BAYG] proved in his 1902 thesis that Riemann forms exist for functions that are discontinuous on sets of measure zero. Lebesgue's own form exists for simple functions on measurable spaces. For 10 points--name this operation from calculus, known to Newton as an antiderivative.

ANSWER: **integral**

**10** He was elected to the 5<sup>th</sup> National Assembly in 1961, but it never met because of a coup. After that, he lost three presidential elections and got a PhD in political science in 1992 at the Diplomatic Academy of the Foreign Ministry of Russia. In 1979 US intervention got his death sentence commuted. Finally elected president in 1997 after forming a coalition with President Kim Jong-Pil--for 10 points--name this Nobel Peace Prize winner.

ANSWER: **Kim Dae Jung**

**11** Descended from Bohemian nobles, he studied architecture before being influenced by Liebig to switch to chemistry. Traveling to London in 1853, he came to his theory of carbon's tetravalency after he dozed off on a bus, and dreamt of long carbon chains. For 10 points--name this chemist who divined the structure of benzene in a dream in which he saw a snake biting its own tail.

ANSWER: Friedrich August von **Kekulé**

**12** The Persians believed he was the son of Zurvan, and called him Lord Wisdom. His son Atar battled Azhi Dahaka, the great dragon of the sky, and bound it in chains on a high mountain. He led the Amesha Spentas, or Heavenly Host to rid the world of evil, darkness, and deceit. Represented by a winged disc--for 10 points--name this deity, the god of prophetic revelation and creator of everything, who defeated Ahriman.

ANSWER: **Ahura Mazda**

**13** Born into a poor aristocratic Russian family, he immigrated to France soon after the 1917 Revolution. His poetry won him the Pushkin prize in 1903, but soon turned to prose, writing such novels as *The Village* and *The Well of Days*. His reputation, though, rests upon his short stories, including the collection *The Gentleman from San Francisco*. For 10 points--in 1933, who became the first Russian recipient of the Nobel Prize in Literature?

ANSWER: Ivan Alexeyevich **Bunin**

**14** Lesser-known varieties include kimzeyite, majorite, and knorringite. It has the general formula  $X_3Y_2Si_3O_{12}$ , where X and Y can be calcium, iron, manganese, magnesium, aluminum, or chromium. More common varieties include andradite, almandine, and pyrope. Quite hard, it always splits into pieces with sharp edges, so it is often used in sandpaper. For 10 points--name this mineral, usually dark red, that is January's birthstone.

ANSWER: **garnet**

**15** In Chapter 1, the four title characters discuss what to get each other for Christmas, but they decide to buy something for Marmee instead. As the novel goes on, some of them visit Mrs. Gardiner's house for a New Year's Eve party, go to Vanity Fair, visit Laurence to go camping, travel to New York City, and attend Meg's wedding at the beginning of part two. For 10 points--name this Louisa May Alcott novel.

ANSWER: **Little Women**

**16** Damage to them, over the course of an organism's life, is involved in aging. For reasons not yet well understood, their DNA is about 10 to 20 times as prone to damage as nuclear DNA. That these organelles have their own DNA at all is evidence they arose from an ancient symbiosis, probably between an amoeba-like cell and a bacterium. For 10 points--name this organelle, central to aerobic metabolism and the site of oxidative phosphorylation.

ANSWER: mitochondria or mitochondrion

**17** Nearly 80% of its land is pasture; the remaining area is about equally divided between forest and desert, with only a small amount of cropland. With a population of just over two million, it is one of the world's most sparsely populated countries. Completely landlocked--for 10 points--name this country, home to the Gobi desert, with capital at Ulan Bator, whose "inner" counterpart is contained within China.

ANSWER: Mongolia or Mongol Uls or Outer Mongolia

**18** Divided into three parts, "Homecoming," "The Hunted," and "The Haunted," it is set at the end of the Civil War. General Ezra Mannon returns home from the war to find his wife Christine having an affair with Adam Brant. The lovers conspire to murder the general. In revenge, his children, Lavinia and Orin, drive their mother to suicide. For 10 points--name this play based on a Greek tragedy, written by Eugene O'Neill.

ANSWER: Mourning Becomes Electra

**19** Beset by conflict between the villages of Malamocco and Eraclea, its government was moved to a compromise location. In AD 1000, the Byzantine Emperor granted its leader Pietro Orsoleo III the title of Duke of Dalmatia. The target of the 1508 League of Cambrai, it established its dominance over the Mediterranean in 1381 by defeating Genoa. For 10 points--name this Italian city-state, which led the Fourth Crusade, that was governed by a Doge.

ANSWER: Venice or Venezia

**20** This ex-schoolteacher and author of *The Faith We Have Not Kept* was the first person elected to a major federal office by write-in ballot. Though he resigned less than two years later, he was re-elected within a year. He set a world record by speaking for 24 hours, 18 minutes straight about civil rights, the year after he wrote the "Southern Manifesto" against *Brown v. Board of Education*. For 10 points--name this 1948 Dixiecrat candidate for President.

ANSWER: (James) Strom Thurmond

**21** He is the son of Anshar and Kishar, and he lives in the third heaven. With his first consort, Antu, he fathered the underworld gods and the seven evil demons. For 10 points--name this sky god and king of the gods in early Babylonian mythology.

ANSWER: Anu

**22** His father was a pioneer in the organization and development of the modern trust company. An ambulance driver late in World War I, his experiences became part of his 1921 anti-war novel, *Three Soldiers*. He then worked in Europe and elsewhere as a newspaper correspondent. For 10 points--name this author of a famous trilogy on American life called *USA*.

ANSWER: John Roderigo Dos Passos [HN: his father was lawyer John Randolph Dos Passos]

**23** Tradition states that in this battle, named for a nearby river, Alexander the Great defeated an army of 40,000 while losing just 110 men. The opposing cavalry took up positions on the far side of the river; Alexander's men had difficulty breaking through until Alexander himself crossed the river with his heavy cavalry, breaking Darius III's formation. For 10 points--name this 334 BC battle which paved the way for Alexander's conquest of Persia.

ANSWER: Battle of the Granicus

**24** Five days after killing the Magi in 521 BC, the seven conspirators gathered to discuss how best to rule the nation. Otanes spoke first, supporting democracy; Megabyzus spoke second, supporting oligarchy; Darius spoke last, supporting monarchy. Darius won over the other four conspirators, and was named king. For 10 points--name this meeting of Persian nobles, one of the earliest recorded discussions of different forms of government.

ANSWER: The Constitutional Debate of Persia

**25** Called The Swankers just after their formation in 1975, they soon changed their names. Known for violence at their performances, a girl was blinded in a glass-smashing incident involving the band's most fearsome fan--who later became a member. The negative publicity didn't prevent them from signing a contract with EMI and releasing their single "Anarchy in the UK." For 10 points--name this punk band who urged fans to *Never Mind the Bollocks*.

ANSWER: Sex Pistols

**26** A lawyer in Nixon's New York law firm, he wrote speeches for Spiro Agnew's 1972 "Red Meat" attacks on the media. His message of nativism, social conservatism, and isolationism earned him an upset victory in the 1996 New Hampshire primary. For 10 points--name this politician, famous for his misguided 1992 call at the Republican National Convention for a "culture war," the most recent presidential candidate of the Reform Party.

ANSWER: Pat(rick) Buchanan

**27** While visiting Scotland, he wrote the *Ruy Blas* overture. He spent much of his life on his solo piano works, which he called *Lieder ohne Worte* [VOHR-tuh], or *Songs without Words*. His oratorio *St. Paul* may be an allegory of his own family history of conversion. For 10 points--name this German composer of the *Hebrides Overture* who also wrote incidental music for *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

ANSWER: Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy

**28** They grew out of two groups, one of which preached the oneness of God instead of the Trinity, and the other of which believed that all people were saved. Those groups merged in 1961 to form this denomination, which saw one minister, James Reeb, killed during the Civil Rights movement, and which affirmed same-sex marriage in 1996. For 10 points--name this "non-creedal" Judeo-Christian denomination.

ANSWER: Unitarian Universalism

**29** His father, who nicknamed him after Nguyen Phong, a Vietnamese friend, has written a book on how to raise a winner. He uses equipment made by Mizuno, Cobra, Cleveland, Titleist, and Nike. His Stanford teammates called him "The Person," but he abandoned them after only two years. Though he fired his caddy "Fluff," he made over \$8 million on the greens last year alone. For 10 points--name this golfer, the youngest ever to win all four majors.

ANSWER: Eldrick "Tiger" Woods

**30** This "Oriental Republic"'s first 20<sup>th</sup> century president, Jose Batlle [BAT-yeh] y Ordóñez, won a civil war against the National Party and modernized its main port. In the 1960s, Jorge Pacheco Areco took over, banning many leftist groups. After Pacheco's fall, a military junta failed to gain legitimacy when their proposed 1980 constitution was rejected. For 10 points--name this country, once the Cisplatine province of Brazil.

ANSWER: Oriental Republic of Uruguay or República Oriental del Uruguay

It is a device that blocks unauthorized access to an organization's local area network (LAN).

ANSWER: **firewall**

A software routine stored in read-only memory (ROM), startup routines and input/output instructions are stored in this format.

ANSWER: **firmware**

A form used in some expert systems and other artificial-intelligence applications, variables can have degrees of truthfulness or falsehood represented by a range of values between 1 (true) and 0 (false).

ANSWER: **fuzzy logic****4** Name these types of taxes, 10 points each.

Personal income tax on wages, salaries, dividends, or other income that is taxed at the source to ensure that it reaches the tax authority.

ANSWER: **withholding** tax

A tax on goods and services, applied at each stage of production of a commodity. Its introduction brought down the government of Japanese Prime Minister Takeshita in 1989.

ANSWER: **VAT** or **value-added** tax

Federal and state tax imposed upon the property of persons after their death.

ANSWER: **estate** tax

- [5] This quarterback led the Packers to victory in the first two Super Bowls.

ANSWER: Bart **Starr**

- [10] This 44-year-old is a second-string QB for the Kansas City Chiefs.

ANSWER: Warren **Moon**

- [15] A running back for the Dolphins in the 1970s, he pled guilty to selling cocaine in 1982.

ANSWER: Eugene "Mercury" **Morris**

**6** Name these members of the Constitutional Convention, 15 points each.

This Connecticut shoemaker turned judge was the only man to sign the Articles of Association, the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, *and* the Constitution.

ANSWER: Roger **Sherman**

Hailing from Massachusetts, this future Senator and ambassador to Great Britain ran unsuccessfully as a Federalist for President in 1816.

ANSWER: Rufus **King**

**7** For the stated number of points, name these explorers of Australia.

- [10] In 1642, sailing for the Dutch East India Company, he discovered an island whose capital today is Hobart.

ANSWER: Abel **Tasman**

- [15] In 1688, this English adventurer visited Australia's western coast, making the first recorded landing by an Englishman.

ANSWER: William **Dampier**

- [5] This navigator of the ship *Endeavour* visited Australia's eastern coast in 1770.

ANSWER: James **Cook**

**8** This author emigrated to America from Lebanon in 1894. 10 points each.

Name this author of *The Prophet*.

ANSWER: Kahlil **Gibran** [ZHIH-bran]

In Boston, Gibran led this school of Arab-American writers.

ANSWER: The **Bond of the Pen**

This 1906 collection of highly moral stories, in Arabic, concentrates on oppressive marriage practices and corrupt clergy.

ANSWER: ***Nymphs of the Valley*** or ***Arâ'is al-murûj***

**9** Name these icy Alaskan bodies of water, for the stated number of points.

- [5] This strait separates Alaska with the northeastern Russian peninsula.

ANSWER: **Bering** Strait

- [10] The port of Valdez [val-DEEZ] and Jewel's hometown of Homer are both located on this gulf.

ANSWER: Gulf of **Alaska**

- [15] Point Hope, a frigid port in the northwest of the state, is located on this sea, north of the Bering Strait.

ANSWER: **Chukchi** Sea

ANSWER: The Trojan Women or Troades

Like Copland, this composer's *Ebony Concerto* is written for clarinet.

ANSWER: Igor Fyodorovich Stravinsky

Anne Elliot lives an unhappy life with her father Sir Walter Elliot. After being convinced by others to turn down a marriage proposal by Captain Wentworth, she finds Wentworth back in her life.

This adjective describes the period of ventricular relaxation, corresponding to a minimum in blood pressure.

ANSWER: diastolic or diastole [dye-AA-stoh-lee]

The volume of blood pumped by each ventricle per minute, not the total by both ventricles, it is the product of heart rate and stroke volume.

ANSWER: cardiac output [prompt on "CO"]

The maximum volume of air a person can expire after maximal inspiration, it is the total lung capacity minus the residual volume.

ANSWER: vital capacity [prompt on "VC"]
