1. After shooting a wild swan, he is unable to answer [gur-ne-mans-ses] Gurnemanz's questions about his origins, and becomes enraged when the heathen sorceress Kundry reveals his past. Later, Klingsor encourages Kundry to seduce him, but he rejects her, and when Klingsor tries to kill him with the spear, he grasps it, makes the sign of the cross, and destroys Klingsor's castle. Years later, he appears in black armor, baptizes Kundry, to be made king of the knights of the Grail. After healing Amfortas, he is crowned. For 10 points - name this title character of the last opera of Richard Wagner.

Answer: Parsifal

2. Its setting is purported to be based on the town of Peterborough, given the latitude and longitudinal coordinates and because the author was a fellow at New Hampshire's MacDowell Colony at the time it was written. The play's limited action focuses on George Gibbs's courtship of Emily Webb, who dies in childbirth in Act III. Linked by the use of an omniscient narrator called "The Stage Manager" - for ten points - what is this 1938 Pulitzer Prize play by Thornton Wilder set in Grover's Corners?

Answer: Our Town

3. They are closely related to the *Chelecerate Clade*, and even more closely to the *Helmetiidae*. Many have a rostral plate, and all have hypostomal wings. Their distinctive pygidium is at the posterior end of the middle of their three axial body sections. Over 5000 genera are known, many of which were discovered in the Burgess Shale. For 10 points - name these ancient arthropods, named for the division of their body into three axial lobes.

Answer: trilobites

4. One translation of his given name is "he who places two bets." Born in 1742, he attended the Moor's Charity School for Indians, where he learned how to speak English. During the French and Indian War, he fought with Sir William Johnson, his sister Molly's husband, and during the American Revolution, he fought at the Battle of Long Island, on the British side. For 10 points - name this Mohawk leader, who moved his tribe to Canada's Grand River basin after the American Revolution.

Answer: Joseph Brant

Accept: Thayendanegea

5. He tells his nephew that he will never be able to get out of the jungle by fighting fair with a stranger. He himself came out of the jungle as a rich man at the age of 21 although he ended up mining diamonds in Africa only after going to Alaska when he was 17. He died before the action of the play begins, but he still appears in his brother's visions, where he represents the success that his brother was never able to attain. For 10 points - name this character, created by Arthur Miller, who was once turned down as a partner by his brother, Willy Loman.

Answer: Ben Loman

6. Headquartered in Denver, Colorado, this 21-year old company has expanded from a small business in the Capitol Hill neighborhood to a corporation that boasts over 1,800 locations worldwide. Some of their signature sauces include Red Wine Vinaigrette and Santa Fe Sauce and the "Classic Italian" is their best selling sandwich. Recently named the fastest growing sandwich chain the United States - for ten points - name this "quick service restaurant" famous for toasted subs.

Answer: Quizno's Subs

7. Formed by the union of the Argun and Shilka rivers, its principal tributaries are from the north are the Zeya, the Bureya, and the Amgun rivers and the Sungari and the Ussuri from the south.

Known to the Chinese as "the River of the Black Dragon," it empties into the Tatar Strait. The Treaty of Aigun in 1858 gave the left bank of the river to Russia. For ten points - name this river that forms part of the border between Russia and China.

Answer: Amur River

8. In modern labs, this experiment is usually done with latex spheres. After the spheres are injected into a chamber, one looks through a microscope and turns on an electric field to suspend the spheres. When the field is turned off, the terminal velocity is measured, allowing one to find the exact charge of the sphere, which is an integral multiple of the electron charge. For 10 points -- this describes what experiment, which Robert Millikan used to measure the electron charge?

Answer: Millikan oil drop experiment

Accept: Millikan experiment

9. They took as an axiom that agriculture was the only economic activity that yielded a surplus, as manufacturing took up as much value in inputs as it produced in output. Based on this assumption, they advocated the abolition of all taxes except the land tax in a work written by the Marquis de Mirabeau and are now known as early proponents of laissez-faire capitalism. For 10 points - name this group of 18th century economic thinkers headed by Francois Quesnay.

Answer: physiocrats

10. Its first English translation was published in 1950 by the New Directions publishing house, which was associated with the Beat Movement. Influenced by psychoanalysis and the German Romantics, its popularity surged in the 1960s because of its exhortations to "find yourself" and exploration of Buddhist thought. As it follows a young Brahmin in 5th and 6th century India as he sets out with his friend, Govinda, it was dubbed by one critic "an Indian *Catcher in the Rye*." For ten points - name this 1922 novel by Hermann Hesse.

Answer: Siddhartha

11. The first American student of Nadia Boulanger, his 1925 work *Symphony for Organ and Orchestra* was written for her. Later, his work *Connotations* was written for the opening of Lincoln Center. His operas include *The Tender Land* and *The Second Hurricane*, and he also composed the choral work *Twelve Poems of Emily Dickinson* and the film scores for *Of Mice and Men* and *Our Town*. For 10 points - name this American composer of *Billy the Kid*, *Rodeo*, and *Appalachian Spring*.

Answer: Aaron Copland

12. He added several elements to the traditional four, including flesh, bone, leaf and bark. These additions also accounted for change within an organism. His proposal that the Sun was an incandescent stone larger than Greece brought about his banishment from Athens, though his close association with Pericles may have had more to do with it. For 10 points, name this Greek philosopher who posited that the force of reason or *nous* organized the universe.

Answer: Anaxagoras

13. This team's first manager was 9-time all star Joe Gordon, and Lou Piniella led the team in hits, doubles, and batting average in its inaugural season.* In its third season, this team posted a winning record, and it won its division in its eighth, ninth, and tenth seasons, before winning the American League pennant in 1980. For 10 points -- name this franchise, founded in 1969, whose all-time leader in several major offensive categories is George Brett.

Answer: Kansas City Royals (accept either)

14. He translated the Merchant of Venice and Julius Caesar into Swahili. The leader of a political party called Cha-ma Cha Ma-pin-du-zi, his political program was outlined in the Arusha Declaration. One of the founders of the Organization of African Unity, he ordered the Tanzanian army to overthrow Idi Amin in 1979. For 10 points - name this man who saw his country united with Zanzibar in 1964, the first president of Tanganyika.

Answer: Julius Nyerere

15. Accompanied by castanets, guitar, and songs sung by the dancers, this courtship dance is danced by a single couple who do not touch. At the end of certain measures, the music stops abruptly and the dancers remain rigid until it is resumed. It can also refer to songs consisting of improvised satirical, religious, or romantic verses, sung to melodies improvised according to set rules that accompany the dance or as solos. For ten points - name this Spanish dance popular in 18th century Europe, performed by Scaramouche in Queen's *Bohemian Rhapsody*.

Answer: Fandango

16. The van der Pol type has a constant which affects the degree of non-linearity, and parametric ones satisfy Hill's equation. The quartic type is usually analyzed with perturbation theory, while the Duffing type is both damped and driven. A critically damped one will gradually go to its equilibrium point without overshoot, while a completely undamped one can bounce back and forth endlessly. A pendulum and a mass on a spring are examples of - for 10 points - what type of device, the most basic form being the simple harmonic?

Answer: harmonic oscillator

Do not accept: "simple harmonic oscillator," since only the last part refers to simple ones

17. As Dan Kavanagh, he has written four crime novels centered around Duffy, a free-lance security system specialist. His most recent work under his own name is *Love, etc*, a continuation of his novel, *Taking it Over*; he has received the Somerset Maugham Award for *Metroland*, the 1987 Gutenberg Prize, and is a two-time Booker Prize nominee for *Flaubert's Parrot* and *England, England*. For 10 points - identify this British author, whose *In The Land of Pain* just received its U.S. publication in January 2003.

Answer: Julian Barnes

18. It was at her favorite residence, the Chateau de Chenonceau in the Loire Valley of France, that her son was married to Mary, Queen of Scots in 1560. Attaining the title of "dauphiness" upon the death of her husband, she remained in political obscurity until her husband, Henry, the Duke of Orleans, ascended to the throne as Henry the II. For ten points - name this Italian-born, French royal who was the daughter of Lorenzo, Duke of Urbino, the heir to a wealthy Florentine family.

Answer: Catherine de' Medici

19. This scale was created by two people in 1971, one a doctor at the University of Chicago, and the other the then Director of the National Severe Storms Forecast Center. It can only be applied after the event which is designed to measure takes place, because it does not measure the event itself, but rather the damage that the event inflicts. For 10 points - name this scale, whose ratings range from F0 to F5, used to measure the intensity and wind speed of a tornado.

Answer: Fujita-Pearson Tornado Intensity Scale

20. After an American history class with William B. Hesseltine at the University of Wisconsin, he switched to a history major. His first book, a biography of General Henry Halleck, led to his editing of Dwight Eisenhower's official papers and a two-volume biography of Eisenhower. A founder of National D-Day Museum, his reputation was sullied when he accused of plagiarism in *The Wild Blue*. For 10 points - name this historian whose posthumous memoir is *To America: Personal Reflections of an Historian*.

Answer: Stephen E. Ambrose

21. "Parson's Pleasure" and "Royal Jelly" were two of the many short stories written by this author, and he used his experiences flying with the RAF in World War II to write his autobiographical *Going Solo*. However, he is best known for his children's books which were often illustrated by Quentin Blake. For 10 points - name this author who penned such classics as *Danny, the Champion of the World*, and *James and the Giant Peach*.

Answer: Roald Dahl

22. His meeting with Joseph Blackburn in 1753 led to his adoption of Blackburn's rococo styling, especially the use of portrait d'apparat, the portrayal of subjects in real life settings, made him a rarity among artists in 18th Century America. During his years in London, he painted his best known non-portrait work, his struggle between human and nature in the 1778 painting *Watson and the Shark*. For 10 points - name this Colonial Boston artist.

Answer: John Singleton Copley

23. The lion and oak tree in this province's coat of arms represent England, while the three saplings represent the three counties of the province. It has the highest population density of any of Canada's provinces, even though it has the smallest population. For 10 points - name this province, home of Lucy Maud Montgomery's *Anne of Green Gables*, and whose capital is Charlottetown.

Answer: Prince Edward Island

24. They began their settlements around 1200 BCE. It was thought that a drought forced them to abandon their homes, but recent evidence suggests that the drought simply was not bad enough to force migration. Other theories about their disappearance include internecine war and religious upheaval. There has been recent controversy about some bones containing evidence of cannibalism. For 10 points, name these ancient people, the probable ancestors of the Hopi.

Answer: Anasazi

25. He attracted the attention of Herb Cohen at a young age, and recorded his first album, *Closing Time*, in 1973. He later married Kathleen Brennan before writing a play with her entitled *Frank's Wild Years* and film roles included both *Rumblefish* and *The Outsiders*. His latest albums, *Alice* and *Blood Money* achieved critical success, but they did not match the success of his *Rain Dogs* and *Swordfishtrombones*. For 10 points - identify this singer famous for "Jockey Full of Bourbon" and "Downtown Train."

Answer: Tom Waits

26. This god, in whose honor the Isthmian games were held, had to send Delphinus after Amphitrite in order to marry her. During the Trojan War, he took the side of the Greeks because of his dispute with Laomedon, but he would end up becoming the enemy of Odysseus in particular. The father of Polyphemus the Cyclops, name - for 10 points - this Greek god of the sea.

Answer: Poseidon

5. Identify these commonly used sorting algorithms for 10 points each.

A. (10) Developed by C.A.R. Hoare, this $n \log n$ sort uses two pivot element to recursively sort array elements around it.

Answer: quicksort

B. (10) This sorting algorithm treats each half of the array as a list to be recombined in sorted order. It recursively splits the array into halves for recombining. It also runs in $n \log n$ time.

Answer: mergesort

C. (10) This sort looks at each digit in each number in the array and arranges the array elements according to that digit, starting from most to least significant.

Answer: radix sort

(30) Most of his early work, such as *A Nest of Gentlefolk* and *On the Eve*, appeared in the magazine *The Contemporary*, which he helped to edit.

(20) He spent the last twenty years of his life in France and Germany; while at Baden-Baden, he argued with Dostoyevsky over his novel *Smoke*, which claimed that Russia could be saved only by turning to the West.

(10) His 1862 novel *Fathers and Sons* deals with the nihilism of Bazarov, a superfluous man.
