B1. Identify these leading figures of the American Revolution from brief descriptions. 5 pts. each.

1. This distinguished cavalry commander was the father of Robert E. Lee

Answer: Henry "Lighthorse Harry" Lee

2. This Boston merchant was president of the Continental Congress from 1775 to 1777.

Answer: John Hancock

3. This man organized the protests against the Stamp Act and was a leading instigator of the Boston Tea Party. He was also a founding member of the Sons of Liberty and the most influential member of the lower House of the Massachusetts legislature from 1765 to 1774.

Answer: Samuel Adams

4. This Virginian gave the speech which ended "Caesar had his Brutus, Charles I had his Cromwell, and George III may profit from their example".

Answer: Patrick Henry

T2. Born in Belgium around 1580, he was one of the first great painters of the 17th century Dutch school, he is best known for his excellent portraits. In the 1620's and 30's, his career was at its height. For 10 points, name this painter of The Laughing Cavalier.

1. From the Italian for "bright and dark" it refers to the technique of painting three-dimensional figures and space through the distribution of light and shadow.

2. From the Italian for "smoke", it is used to describe the blending of tones or colors so subtly they melt into one another without perceptible transitions.

2. quantity x plus 1 to the 4th [$(x + 1)^4$]

Answer: $4(x+1)^3$

Answer: Madagascar

4. For 5 points, what is the only island in the list on which you would find portions of three different nations?

Answer: Borneo

Answer: euphemism

2. What is the absolute value of the potential energy of either object in relation to the other?

Answer: 18 joules

This method includes outlining a design with metal filaments, filling in with colored enamels, and firing to produce a glossy finish, especially attractive in jewelry. For ten points, name this artistic method.
