- 2) A colorless inflammable gas, it is used as the starting point in many organic syntheses. Its other use is more widely known: when mixed with oxygen and lit, it is used in cutting and welding torches. FOR 10 POINTS, name this gas with the chemical formula C_2H_2 .

A: ACETYLENE

- 3) In the treble clef, the four spaces stand for the notes F, A, C, and E. The bass clef's four spaces stand, from bottom to top, FOR 10 POINTS what four notes?

A: A, C, E, G

- 4) FIRST AND LAST NAME REQUIRED: a turn-of-the-century American poet and short story writer, whose works include "The Luck of Roaring Camp" and the only man in WWF history to hold the tag team title, World title, and Intercontinental title all on two different occasions, have identically pronounced names. FOR TEN POINTS, give the common name.

A: BRET HARTE / BRETT HART

- 5) Captain Kathryn Janeway looked to become the first female to take command in a science fiction TV show, but she was nosed out this fall by Earth 2's Devon Adair. FOR 10 POINTS, name the actress who plays Adair, whose first TV role was that of Susan Smith, the significant other of Harry Hooperman.

A: Debrah FARENTINO

- 6) In the original language, it begins, "En arche en ho logos" (enn arKAY ane ho LO-goss) which means in English, "In the beginning was the Word." It continues, "And the Word was with God, and the Word was God." FOR 10 POINTS, name this fourth book of the New Testament, the only non-synoptic Gospel.

A: The Gospel According to JOHN

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- 7) Its legislature is made up of a 27-member Senate, and a 53-member House of Representatives, both of which are led by the Popular Democratic Party. Its governor is Rafael Hernandez-Colon. FOR 10 POINTS, name this U.S. territory.

A: PUERTO RICO

- 8) This rock, highly metamorphosed from shales, schists, or granites, resembles granite in that the minerals found in it are quite large. FOR 10 POINTS, name this rock most notable for the loosely defined colored banding of its minerals.

A: GNEISS

- 9) She was born with the name Caryn Johnson in New York City in 1950, but changed to a more attention-grabbing stage name some time later. Since then, she has starred in "Ghost", "The Color Purple", and more recently, in "Made in America" with her ex-beau Ted Danson. FOR 10 POINTS, name her.

A: Whoopi GOLDBERG

- 10) Originally developed as a two-stage ICBM, it was later put to use as a space-launch vehicle. FOR 10 POINTS, name this rocket which shares its name with the collective name for the twelve children of Uranus and Ge (Gay).

A: TITAN

- 11) His political career took a slip in 1964, in a quite literal sense. A fall while getting out of the tub ended his quest for a US Senate seat, which he eventually gained in 1974. FOR 10 POINTS, name this man whose quest for the Presidency in 1984 lacked the right stuff of his pre-political career as a Mercury astronaut.

A: John GLENN

- 12) A five-time welterweight and middleweight world boxing champion, a Canadian anesthesiologist, the founder of the Sinn Fein (Shin Fine) movement, and the director of "The Birth of a Nation" all share, FOR 10 POINTS, what surname?

A: GRIFFITH (Emile, Harold, Arthur, D.W.)

- 13) Its flag is green with a yellow circle in the middle. In the circle is a hand holding a flaming torch aloft. FOR 10 POINTS, name this African nation better known in College Bowl circles for bordering a whole bunch of other countries.

A: ZAIRE

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- 14) TWO PIECES OF INFO NEEDED IN PROPER ORDER: Written defamation and spoken defamation are known by distinct legal names. FOR 10 POINTS, name these two subcategories of attacking another person's reputation.

A: LIBEL and SLANDER

- 15) In chemistry, it's defined as the raising of atoms to energy states above the lowest possible. In a famous Beach Boys song, it's what she's giving me after I pick up good vibrations. FOR 10 POINTS, name this 10 letter word?

A: EXCITATIONS

- 16) His fame was built by the 1936 book, *Adventures in Good Eating*, a guide to good highway dining. He teamed with businessman Roy Park in the 1940s, put his name on boxed baked goods, and within 3 weeks of opening had taken half of the market for cake mix. FOR 10 POINTS, name this cake and brownie king.

A: DUNCAN HINES

- 17) This word is the name of a province in Thailand, but it's better known as a type of satire. The term was coined from the French for "let us drink" in the 17th century, but examples of the genre are found as early as Aristophanes. FOR 10 POINTS, name this word, found in the title of a famous humor magazine.

A: LAMPOON

- 18) The Nautilus is launched, the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization is formed, McCarthy is condemned by the Senate, and the New York Giants win the World Series thanks to pinch-hitting hero Dusty Rhodes. FOR 10 POINTS, name this year, also the year the Supreme Court ruled on Brown vs. Board of Education of Topeka.

A: 1954

- 19) He began to attend board meetings of London's University College Hospital in 1832, and never failed to make a meeting for the next 94 years. How did he manage such a record? He started attending the meetings after his death. He had left his estate to the hospital on the condition of his body being preserved and made present for all such meetings. FOR 10 POINTS, name this utilitarian philosopher, the formulator of the "Hedonic Calculus."

A: Jeremy BENTHAM

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- 20) This dog's name is German for "badger dog." It was bred in Germany for the purpose of pursuing badgers into their burrows, which is why its characteristic body shape is what it is. FOR 10 POINTS, name this breed, famous for its short legs and narrow body.

A: DACHSHUND

- 21) Pope Pius XI worked as one just before becoming Pope. Mao Zedong also worked as one, but was overlooked for advancement and opted for a career change. Others who have worked as one of these include J. Edgar Hoover, David Hume, Gottfried von Leibniz, and Casanova. Archibald MacLeish and Daniel Boorstein served as the one for Congress. FOR 10 POINTS, name this profession.

A: LIBRARIAN

- 22) Some people seem to have a psychological block against spelling questions. Prove that you're not one of them, FOR 10 POINTS, by spelling "psychological."

A: P S Y C H O L O G I C A L

- 23) His latest novel centers on Dr. Farrokh Daruwalla, a surgeon born in Bombay, trained in Vienna, and living in Toronto. The plot includes several odd characters, including dwarves, a range of prostitutes, and an Iowa hippie married to an Indian homicide detective. No wonder it's called *A Son of the Circus*. FOR 10 POINTS, name the author, known for works such as *The World According to Garp* and *The Hotel New Hampshire*.

A: John IRVING

- 24) Queen of France for 15 years, she accompanied her husband Louis VII on the Second Crusade. A few years after their return, the honeymoon had ended, and the marriage was annulled. In 1152, she married Henry Plantagenet who became Henry II of England. FOR 10 POINTS, name this mother of Richard the Lion Heart.

A: ELEANOR OF AQUITAINE

- 25) Monty Python fans will remember it as the architectural term that caused a Welsh coal strike until a proper definition could be offered. It is defined as the rectangular space between two triglyphs of a Doric frieze. FOR 10 POINTS, what is this term?

A: METOPE

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- 26) Their religion centered on a jaguar god, and their art forms influenced all later cultures of the region. Their temple cities and huge stone sculptures date to 1200 BCE. FOR 10 POINTS, name these ancient Mexican people who are considered the first civilization of the Western Hemisphere.

I: This award, named for a Princeton player who died in WWI, it is the Heisman of college hockey. Past winners include Neal Broten and Paul Kariya, but alas no BU players.

A: HOBAY BAKER award

II: This school has won 2 of the last 3 NCAA titles, and was runner up in the other one. It won the 1994 title by beating, you saw it coming, BU.

II. A Scottish doctor, Joseph Bell's ability to diagnose patients just by looking at them led one of his students to put a similar deductive ability in this stylish gumshoe.

A: SHERLOCK HOLMES

III. A slave who became overseer, Josiah Henson later fled to Canada with his family, becoming a prototype for this Civil War-era title character.

A: UNCLE TOM

6.(30) Remember Bloom County? We do. FOR 10 POINT EACH, answer these questions about the Glorious Predecessor to that Monstrosity of the funny pages, Outland.

First, by what name did Bill the Cat go, as a televangelist?

8.(25) 1994 marked the 15th anniversary of the fall of the Shah of Iran. FOR 10 POINTS EACH AND A 5 POINT BONUS FOR BOTH, answer these questions on Mohammed Reza Pahlavi.

- I. Installed on the Peacock Throne at the end of World War II, the Shah's rule was challenged early on by this man, a fervent nationalist and prime minister from 1951 until a CIA-sponsored coup toppled him in 1953.

A: Mohammed MOSSADEQ

- II. The Shah's life in exile took him to the Bahamas, Mexico, Panama, the US, and then to this country, also the first country he fled to, where he died of cancer in 1980.

A: EGYPT

9.(20) FOR 5 POINT EACH, given a noted personality from the jazz/Big Band era, name the instrument for which he was most noted.

- I. Count Basie A: PIANO
- II. John Coltrane A: Tenor SAXophone
- III. Herbie Mann A: FLUTE
- IV. Buddy Rich A: DRUMS

10.(30) This is a conceptually simple African geography question. Obviously, South Africa is the southernmost nation of that continent, but FOR 10 POINTS EACH, name the three African nations most extremely situated, in the other three cardinal directions.

A: TUNISIA, SENEGAL, SOMALIA

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11.(25) For the stated value, answer these questions about Islam.

I. Muslims are required to pray towards Mecca, FOR 5 POINTS, how many times daily?

A: 5

II. When they are in Mecca, they pray facing towards, FOR TEN POINTS, what square building?

A: The KABAHA

III. FOR TEN POINTS, what color is the rock inside the Kabah?

A: BLACK

12.(25) Nursery rhymes seem innocent enough, but they're based on stuff that seems a bit odd. Given the genesis behind a rhyme, name it FOR 10 POINTS. There is a % POINT BONUS IF YOU CAN NAME BOTH RHYMES.

I. This nursery rhyme gets its action from the British 17th century practice of jumping over a candle and getting good luck for the upcoming year if it stayed lit.

A: JACK BE NIMBLE

II. This rhyme is based on the destruction of the original timber version of this edifice by the Norwegians in the 11th century. The other 12 stanzas, which are rarely heard, reflect the belief that structures such as this one anger water gods.

A: LONDON BRIDGE

13.(30) FOR 10 POINTS EACH, identify these card games from the descriptions.

I. Usually played by four, each player gets eleven cards. The object is to form melds of three or more cards. First side to 5000 points wins.

A: CANASTA

II. Similar to Chemin de Fer, it's played on a kidney-shaped table. According to Ian Fleming, it's one of James Bond's favorites.

A: BACCARAT

III. A 51-card deck is used, as a queen is removed from a regular deck. The player left with the odd queen loses.

A: OLD MAID

I. FOR 5 POINTS, in what year did this tragedy occur? A: 1912

II. FOR 5 POINTS WITHIN 100, FOR 10 POINTS WITHIN 75 or FOR 15 POINTS WITHIN 50, tell me how many people died in the accident?

A: 1513 (AWARD 5 POINTS FOR 1413-1613, 10 POINTS FOR 1438-1588, or 15 POINTS FOR 1463-1563)

16.(30) Here's a bonus on that most popular of natural anomalies, flightless birds. Given the description, name the bird. Each correct answer is worth 10 POINTS.

I. Found in Australia and Papua New Guinea, this large bird has a razor-sharp nail on the innermost toe which provides a great kicking weapon.

A: CASSOWRY

II. While there are over 100 species of this bird, many of which can fly, several cannot, including the white-throated, Gough Island, and Inaccessible Island varieties.

A: RAIL

III. Now extinct, this bird common to New Zealand had 25 species ranging from turkey size to 10 feet. They were hunted for food and completely disappeared in the 19th century.

A: MOA
