

- [10] In 1801, this Frenchman published a theory of inheritance of acquired traits.
 - ANSWER: Jean Baptiste Pierre Antoine de Monet, Chevalier de Lamarck
- [10] In the 1780s, this Italian claimed that "animal electricity" explained how a brass hook and an iron rod caused a frog's muscles to contract.
 - ANSWER: Luigi Galvani
- [10] In 1745, this English clergyman claimed he had observed spontaneous generation when he boiled chicken broth, sealed it in a flask, and later observed the growth of microorganisms.

ANSWER: John Needham

- [10] Born in 1810, he spent most of his career in Paris; he is known for his dozens of *Preludes, Mazurkas*, and *Études*.
 - ANSWER: Frédéric François Chopin or Fryderyk Franciszek Szopen
- [10] He composed the opera *Manru*, the *Minuet in G*, and the *Polonia* Symphony, but is better known for being the first prime minister of the Polish republic.
 - ANSWER: Ignacy Jan <u>Paderewski</u> [pah-duh-REV-skee]
- [10] His works include *Three Pieces in the Old Style*, and his *Third Symphony*, also called *Symphony of Sorrowful Songs*.
 - ANSWER: Henryk Mikolaj Gorecki [goh-REH-skee]

- [10] Saipan, Aguijan [ah-GWEE-han], Farallón de Medinilla [fah-rah-YON de med-uh-NEE-ya] ANSWER: Northern Mariana Islands or the Marianas
- [10] Great Abaco, New Providence, Eleuthera, and the namesake "Grand" island ANSWER: The Bahamas

- [30] He fought the Moors at Oran in 1791, and served Spain in the War of the Oranges in 1801.
- [20] After defeating loyalists at San Lorenzo in 1813, he was sent to Tucumán to relieve the forces of General Manuel Belgrano.
- [10] He liberate Argentina, then crossed the Andes, liberated Chile, and was made protector of Peru when he marched into Lima in 1821.

- [10] He aroused controversy during World War II when he did not speak out against the Nazi concentration camps.
 - ANSWER: Pius XII or Eugenio Maria Giuseppe Giovanni Pacelli
- [10] He established a constitutional government in 1848. Two years later, he revoked it and ruled Rome with an iron fist for 20 years.
 - ANSWER: Pius IX or Giovanni Maria Mastai-Feretti
- [10] Elected Pope in 1823, he reinstituted a "government of the priests" in the Papal States.
 - ANSWER: Leo XII or Annibale Francesco Clemente Melchiore Girolamo Nicola della Genga

- [30] The marriage of his sister Anna to Vladimir of Kiev in 989 prompted the Kievan Rus' [roos] to adopt Christianity.
- [20] Defeating both Georgia and Armenia in the east, he had recaptured Sicily and was planning to attack Southern Italy at his death in 1025.
- [10] In 1014, he totally blinded 99 out of 100 men, and let a one-eyed man lead them back to Ochrida. After this defeat, Byzantium reincorporated Tsar Samuel's Bulgaria.

[10] In this effect, an atom ejects a secondary electron in the course of filling an inner shell vacancy.

ANSWER: Auger effect

[10] In this effect, passing a current through a circuit where multiple metals are used results in temperature changes at the junctions between different metals.

ANSWER: Peltier effect [do not accept "Seebeck effect"]

ANSWER: Zoroastrianism

[10] These angels wielded flaming swords to keep Adam and Eve out of Eden. In Ezekiel, they are living chariots for Jehovah, standing beside topaz "wheels within wheels."

ANSWER: Cherubim or cherub(s)

[10] In Islamic tradition, this angel will sound the trumpet on the Day of Judgment.

ANSWER: <u>Izrail</u> [iz-RAH-eel] or <u>Israfel</u> or <u>Israfil</u> [do not accept "Azrael"]

- [15] If p is prime, and p is not a factor of a, then $a^p \mod p = a \mod p$ [a to the p is congruent to a, mod p]. ANSWER: Fermat's little theorem
- [15] If p is prime, then $(p-1)! = -1 \pmod{p}$ [the factorial of p minus 1 is congruent to negative 1, mod p]. ANSWER: Wilson's theorem
- 24 Name these anatomical movements, 10 points each.
- [10] This is an inward bending of the body, such as curling one's forearm inward at the elbow.

ANSWER: flexion

[10] This is a movement away from the midline of the body; the knee is designed not to do this.

ANSWER: abduction

[10] This is an upward rotation of the foot at the ankle.

ANSWER: dorsiflexion or dorsal flexion
