1.) In the Tale of Genji, the protagonist likens a lover removing a scarf to the molting stage of this insect. This largely underground insect spends most of life in a nymphal stage. It creates clicking sounds by the contraction of its exoskeleton, in contrast to the striation method used by crickets and grasshoppers. 2013 saw the end of a 17 year dormant stage this insect, with much of the eastern seaboard preparing for invasion that was eventually deemed underwhelming. For ten points, name this insect in the suborder Auchenorrhyncha (awk-ina-rinka), colloquially referred to as a locust.

Cicada

2.) In a 2006 French film about this topic, Audrey Tautou mentors a male protégé in this "occupation" that is predominantly practiced by women. A 2005 rap ditty about this topic samples Ray Charles' 1954 song "I got a woman". In the 2005 Kanye West single, lyrics feature the line, "18 years, 18 years, she got one of yo' kids, got you for 18 years". For ten points give the pejorative term for a typically younger person who cultivates a relationship with a wealthy benefactor in hopes of material or monetary gain.

Gold Digger accept equivalents (ie boy toy, sugar baby)

3.) Conceived by Stanford Engineer Debbie Sterling, and marketed as an engineering toy for girls, this pastel-coloured building set went from concept and prototype to store shelves following a successful 2012 Kickstarter campaign. It differs from conventional construction sets because of its literary component; a companion storybook in which users problem-solve virtual engineering problems faced by characters, using the tangible building components included in this product. For ten points, name this building toy that has a name similar to the titular flaxen-haired nemesis of an ursine trio.

Goldie Blox

4.) Published in 2010 by Little, Brown, and Company, this novel was shortlisted for both the 2010 Man Booker Prize and 2010 Governor General's Award. In an article in Macleans, the novelist cited the events of the horrific Fritzl imprisonment case as the inspiration for this work that may invoke feelings of claustrophobia. For ten points, name this novel by Emma Donoghue which portrays the struggle of Jack and his young mother as they are confined in this titular space by a man they call Old Nick.

Room

5.) This phylum includes the subclass Hirudinea which contains the important species Hirudo medicinalis. Canadian exports of the species Eisenia fetida of the sub-class *Oligochaetes*, are a multimillion dollar industry. Members are covered by a *cuticle* that does not contain *cells* but is *secreted* by cells in the skin underneath, is made of tough, flexible *collagen* that does not molt. For ten points, name this phylum of segmented worms, from the Latin for little

rings.

Annelida (also accept Annelid)

6.) It took 32 years before this author saw her 1981 novel released as her first major film adaptation, starring Willa Holland as Davey, and Pink Power Ranger Amy Jo Johnson as her newly widowed mother. In 2012, the author admitted publicly to a battle with breast cancer, a fact that hits close to home for readers who along with the religiously conflicted character Margaret Simon, once chanted the phrase "We must, we must, we must increase our busts". For ten points, name this American Library Association's Banned Books List maker, who is best known for her coming of age novels "Summer Sisters", "Blubber", "Tiger Eyes" and "Are you there God, It's me, Margaret".

Judy **Blume**

7.) Officially (re)recognized as an official public holiday in Mainland China in 2005, this festival, also known as Duanwu, typically takes place on its namesake date, the fifth day of the fifth month of the Chinese Calendar. During this festival, celebrants often consume sticky rice dumplings called zong zi or guo zong to eat in commemoration of the suicide death of poet Qu Yuan. A highlight of this festival is this watercraft sport named after a legendary creature. For ten points name this spring festival, which was celebrated in Vancouver in 2013, with the 25th annual Rio Tinto Alcan race.

Dragon Boat Festival

8.) Born the second of four sons to an Iraqi Jewish family, his surname means "watchmaker" in Arabic. With his brother Maurice, he co-founded an advertising agency that promoted the Thatcher-lead Tory campaign with the slogan "Labour isn't working". His first purchase as an art collector was a work by minimalist artist Sol LeWitt, and by 2009, he had published a book titled: "My name is [redacted] and I am an artoholic. For ten points, name this namesake art gallery owner, who in June 2013, made headlines for a public altercation with his then wife, cooking show hostess Nigella Lawson.

Charles **Saatchi**

9.) In February 2010, this company filed a notice of intent with the [Surface Transportation Board](#) that it intended to abandon 375 km of track, between Madawaska and Millinocket. Formed in 2002 by [Rail World, Inc](#), this company operates about 25 trains a day over 745 miles of track. CEO Edward Burkhardt has been villainized for his role in the decision to cut crews to one. For ten points, name the rail company at the centre of the Lac-Magantic disaster.

Montreal, Maine and Atlantic (also accept MMA)

10.) The world's 119th largest country, it is composed of four regions: the [Northern](#), [Southern](#), and [Eastern Provinces](#) and the [Western Area](#), with a total area of 71,740 km. It has four distinct geographical regions: coastal [Guinean mangroves](#), the wooded hill country, an upland [plateau](#), and the eastern

mountains. The eastern region includes the country's highest mountain, [Mount Bintumani](#) at 1,948 meters. Bordered by [Guinea](#) to the north and northeast, [Liberia](#) to the south and southeast, and the [Atlantic Ocean](#) to the west. For ten points, name this West African country with its capital at Freetown.

Sierra Leone

11.) King Vira Alakeshwara of [Ceylon](#) was held captive by this explorer and taken back to court to apologize for perceived slights against his mission. Long neglected in official histories, Liang Qihao's 1904 book "Biography of Our Homeland's Great Navigator" reignited interest in this eunuch. A coin found on the Kenyan island of Manda dating from the reign of the Yongle Emperor has provided tantalizing evidence he may have reached the African coast. He made seven journeys exploring the Indian Ocean between 1405 and 1433. For ten points, name this early fifteenth century admiral and explorer.

Zheng He (also accept Cheng Ho)

12.) Although not drafted until the 8th round of the 1981 NHL draft by the St. Louis Blues, this defenceman played in the NHL over parts of two seasons, ultimately amassing 42 games played and 7 points in the NHL. Retooling himself as a coach, he turned to the QMJHL, and eventually won the QMJHL coach of the year award in 1988 as the coach of the league champion Hull Olympiques. For ten points, name this current coach of the New York Rangers, reknowned giggler, and winningest coach in Vancouver Canucks history.

Alain Vigneault

13.) With the founding of this government in August 1919, its nations flag was changed for the second time to the black, red, and gold tricolour that it has once again today. Its first president was Friedrich Ebert, and last was Paul von Hindenberg, and it is generally deemed to have ended with the passage of the Enabling Act of March 1933. Named for the city in which its constitution was drafted, for ten points, what is the common name for the interwar German state up until the founding of Hitler's Third Reich?

Weimar Republic

14.) "I want the fucking Indians out of my park". These were the words then Ontario premier Mike Harris was alleged to have uttered in the days preceding the police shooting of an unarmed Dudley George. Lasting a mere 3 days in September 1995, the effects of this crisis would linger until mid 2007, when it was found that Mike Harris, the federal government, and the Ontario Provincial Police bore all responsibility leading to the death of George. For ten points, what was this ultimate result of a long simmering land-claims dispute named after the provincial park in which it took place.

Ipperwash Crisis

15.) This man served as representative for New York's 9th congressional district from 1999 until June 2011, and since resigning has occasionally gone by the name of "Carlos Danger". Married to Huma Abdelin since mid 2010, he doesn't believe that he's "had any more than three" sexual relationships since

resigning from Congress two years ago after photos of his namesake body part were leaked online. For ten points, name this disgraced serial sexting former congressman and current New York City mayoral candidate.

Anthony **Weiner**

16.) This man's PhD thesis was heavily influenced by fellow RAND Corporation employee, Harry Markowitz, who filled the role of his unofficial doctoral advisor. His thesis discussed a single factor model of security prices. Slightly less well known for his research on the binomial method of option pricing, this economist is best known for his contributions to the development of the Capital Asset Pricing Model. The ratio of the excess return of a security or portfolio to the standard deviation of the returns is named after him. For ten points, who is this economist who won the Nobel Prize in economics in 1990?

William Forsythe Sharpe

17.) Taking her stage name from an artist known for monochromatic artwork featuring aliens and UFOs, this Lord Byng alumna began to experiment with music production whilst studying at McGill University. In May 2011, she opened for Lykke Li on her North American Tour. By 2012, this artist had released her third full length LP entitled, "Visions" featuring the song "Oblivion". FTP name this Canadian musician, who in 2013, was awarded a Juno Award for Electronic Album of the year.

Grimes also accept Claire **Boucher**

18.) Although the playwright of this work wrote it in English, a German translation was performed at the Hofburg Theatre in Vienna in October 1913, almost six months before it premiered in London. The name of this play originates in Greek myth, and is named for a sculptor who fell in love with the statue he carved. For ten points, what is this play, the most most popular one written by George Bernard Shaw, that was the primary inspiration for the 1956 musical, *My Fair Lady*?

Pygmalion

19.) The *casus belli* cited by the aggressor in this conflict was the shelling of a border post in the village of Mainila, though this was later shown to have been staged. A more proximate cause of the conflict was the signing of the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact, which placed the defending country in the Soviet Union's so-called sphere of influence. The defenders in this conflict were massively outgunned and outnumbered, but managed to inflict four times the casualties upon the Soviets during the 105 day duration of this conflict. For ten points, what is this war between the Soviet Union and Finland named for the season in which it occurred?

The Winter War

20.) The seventh largest island in the world, the Tsugaru Strait lies to its north, and the Kanmon Strait lies to its south west. Almost half of its population resides in its Kanto region, which is home to the Tokyo and Kanagawa regions, among others. 1300 km long, and with its highest point at Mt. Fuji, it is also the second most populous island in the world. For ten points, name this largest island of Japan.

Honshu

21.) The plot of this novel can be summarised as follows: An older woman and her younger friend travel to Italy, where the older woman falls in love with a Italian younger man. Meddling family tries to stop the couple from getting married. The couple get married anyways, but the wife dies in childbirth. Concerned with appearances, the meddling family tries to bring the child home to be raised in England. The meddling male relative falls in love with the younger friend, but they can never be together because she's in love with her dead friend's Italian husband. For ten points, name the novel that was adapted into to 1991 British dramatic film of the same name, and that in 1905 was the first novel written by E.M. Forster?

Where Angels Fear to Tread

22.) The name of this element comes from the Greek word for unstable. In the Earth's crust, this element is the least abundant of the non-transuranic elements. The scarcity of this element can be attributed to the short half-lives of all six of its main isotopes, none of which is longer than 12 hours. It generally decays into bismuth or polonium. For ten points, what is this element with atomic number 85 that is the heaviest of the halogens, and that has the symbol At?

Astatine

23.) In this story, a cynical boy meets a girl with the ability to warp and remake reality to fit her desires, but she is unaware of it. Unknowingly, three years prior she warped reality such that aliens, time travellers and espers all exist. The boy, the girl, an alien, a time traveller, and an esper all join a school club. Over the course of the story, the secret identities of the latter three are revealed to the boy, and he learns that they each are pursuing agendas that involve keeping the girl oblivious. First released as a light novel in Japan in 2003, wider popularity came with a eponymous 14 episode anime adaptation by Kyoto Animation in 2006. It has subsequently spawned a series of spin-offs including a movie. For ten points, name this story, named for the girl and her mood?

The Melancholy of Haruhi Suzumiya or Suzumiya Haruhi no Yūtsu

24.) Currently commercially supported by Typesafe Inc, this this mixed functional and imperative programming language was developed by Martin Odersky. Differentiating features of this language include its support for

case classes, a unified type system, and built in parallel collections APIs. It can be compiled to .NET bytecode, although most commonly it is compiled to Java bytecode, and is often viewed as the logical successor to Java. For ten points, what is this decade old programming language, famously adopted early on by Twitter, and named for being a "scalable language"?

C2: 360-363 AD

Flavius Claudius Julianus (also accept Julian the Apostate)

[10] Seen as a symbol of protection in Malta, Italy, and South America, in the United States, it is often presented in support of the Texas Longhorns, or a band that is righteously "rocking out"

Index and pinky pointed up, palm facing out

[10] Often seen as a gesture of acceptance in Europe and North America, in Turkey it is considered a homophobic insult and vulgar in Latin America.

The "OK" sign (thumb and forefinger connecting in a circle, while other 3 fingers are held straight in a "K" formation)
