Answer: Sulfur

T03. In 1937 he died in a plane crash near the great waterfall he had discovered two years earlier. For ten points, who was this American pilot who Died in Venezuela?

Answer: Jimmy Angel

T04. "Congratulations! Today is your day. You're off to great places! You're off and away! That's the first verse of his newest book, *Oh, the Places You'll Go!* For ten, name this doctor and poet.

Answer: Dr. Seuss

T05. Robert Frost read "The Gift Out Right" at the inauguration of John F. Kennedy. For ten points, what Georgia-born poet wrote the poem "The Strength of Fields" for Jimmy Carter's inauguration?

Answer: James Dickey

T06. For ten points, arrange the artist Raphael, Rembrandt, and Rubens in correct chronological order.

Answer: Raphael (born 1483), Rubens (born 1577), and Rembrandt (born 1606)

T07. Since these two countries became independent in 1947, they've fought three wars between them. Now the violence in the Kashmir threatens to begin a fourth. For ten points, what two Asian countries are they?

Answer: India and Pakistan

T08. Her best-selling book of "etiquette for consenting adults" reminds readers that a thank-you is appropriate after a kinky-sex party. The author is Sidney Biddle Barrows. For ten points, how is she better known?

Answer: The Mayflower Madam

T09. It might describe a member of the Chicago Seven after the trial. It also describes a highly reactive molecule or atom with an odd number of electrons. For ten points, what two-word phrase describes them both?

Answer: Free Radical

T10. To the nearest billion, the ⁶ate of the sun and the population of the earth are the same. For ten points how many billion is that?

Answer: Five Billion

T11. His last work was planned as a quadruple fugue using his own name as one of the four themes—but it was never finished. For ten points, who is this master of the fugue who died in 1750?

Answer: Johann Sebastian Bach

NOTE: In the German notation, B was a B-flat and H a B-natural, so Bach could write a theme based on the notes B, A, C, and H.

T12. In 1902 the editor of *Iskra*, the newspaper of the Russian Social Democratic Workers' Party (soon to be called the Communist Party), detailed the concept and role of the party in his pamphlet "What is to Be Done?" For ten points, who was this editor?

Answer: Vladimir Lenin

T13. His friend James Joyce, he once observed, tended towards omniscience and omnipresence, "whereas I work with impotence and ignorance.". For ten points, name this Irish author who won the 1969 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Answer: Samuel Beckett

T14. She created the role of Blanche Dubois in the original 1947 Broadway production of *A Streetcar Named Desire*, and won an Emmy award for the TV version of *Foxfire*. She's been ~~nominated~~ for an Academy Award for *Driving Miss Daisy*. For ten points, name this actress.

Answer: Jessica Tandy

T15. Like Joseph McCarthy, he was a fanatical anti-Communist who once accused President Eisenhower of being a "dedicated, conscious agent of the Communist conspiracy". In 1958 he founded the right-wing John Birch Society. For ten points, name this American extremist.

Answer: Robert Welch

T16. She doesn't leave her bed during the entire course of a thousand-page novel.. She dallies there with her lover Blazes Boylan until her husband Leopold comes home.. For ten points, who is this soliloquizing heroine of James Joyce's *Ulysses*?

Answer: Molly Bloom

T17. It's probably the most unfortunate combination of letters imaginable, but--for ten points--what two-letter combination is the Library of Congress classification for the Bible?

Answer: BS

T18. Gaspra and Ida will be two rendezvous points for the space probe Galileo on its way to Jupiter. For ten points, what are Gaspra and Ida?

Answer: asteroids in the asteroid belt

T19. The Bush cabinet is already looking like the Reagan cabinet. When Congress passed a law requiring shrimp fishermen to use Turtle Excluder Devices, the Secretary of Commerce told the Coast Guard not to enforce it --until his staff reminded him that it was his job to enforce the law. For ten points, who is this Republican?

Answer: Robert Mosbacher

T20. Thomas Rowlandson created a distinctively English variety of this light, energetic, and playful artistic style, most associated with Boucher and Watteau in France. For ten points, what is it?

Answer: Rococo

B01. [30 points] Only two United States presidents have won the Nobel Peace Prize. For 5 points each, name them; for an additional ten points each, name the years in which they won.

Answer: Theodore Roosevelt in 1906 and Woodrow Wilson in 1919

B02. [25 points] The subject of Hugh Whitmore's play *Breaking the Code* is the British mathematician who broke the German Enigma code during World War II, and the developed some of the basic principles of the computer, but committed suicide because he was a homosexual in a society that made homosexuality a crime. For 25 points, name him.

Answer: Alan Turing

B03. [20 points] Louis Sullivan and Frank Lloyd Wright were American architects. For five points each, identify the native country of the following architects:

B18. [20 points] For five points each, according to the *Rubaiyat* of Omar Khayyam, what four things are needed to make a Wilderness "Paradise enow"?

Answer: "A Book of Verses underneath the Bough, A Jug of Wine, a Loaf of Bread—and Thou Beside me singing in the Wilderness..."

B19. [20 points] Romulus and Remus were, according to legend, the founders of the city of Rome.

[1] For ten points, what year is traditionally fixed as the date of the founding of the city?

Answer: 753 B. C.

[2] For 15 points, what Latin phrase—abbreviated 'A.U.C.' and translated as "from the founding of the city"—was used by the Romans for dating?

Answer: ab urbe condita

B20. [30 points] Vladimir Lenin was the first head of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union. Since his death in 1924, there have been only six other General Secretaries—including of course Mikhail Gorbachev. For five points, each, name the other five—with five extra points for naming them in order.

Answer: Joseph Stalin (1927-1953), Nikita Krushchev (1953-1964), Leonid Brezhnev (1964-1982), Yuri Andropov (1982-1984), and Konstantin Chernenko (1984-1985)
