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Toss-Ups

Q2. She suffered mental breakdowns through out her life, and drowned herself in 1941 because she feared another unrecoverable breakdown. Her literary works include "The Waves", "The Years", "A Haunted House", and "To The Light House". FTP, identify this popular member of the Bloomsbury group.

Ans: Virginia WOOLF

Q3. The majority of the stars lie in the main sequence. White dwarfs lie in the lower left corner. Red giants form a thick horizontal band. FTP, name this diagram on which you will find all of the above, a diagram used in astronomy and one that shows luminosity of a star as a function of its surface temperature.

Ans: HERTZSPRUNG-RUSSEL Diagram

Q4. The first meeting was held in the White Mountains of New Hampshire. 44 countries attended but not the USSR which was invited but did not attend. FTP, name this conference that led to the establishment of International Monetary Fund.

Ans: BRETON WOODS Conference

Q5. It was called Jugendstil in Germany, Sezessionstil in Austria and Modernismo in Spain. It was most successfully practiced in the decorative arts. It began in the late 19th Century in Western Europe and did not survive the first world war. FTP, name this decorative art movement.

Ans: ART NOUVEAU

Q6. Drastic cuts in marginal tax rates stimulate investment in new capital and hence overall economic improvement. So contend its proponents, the majority of whom are conservative Republicans. FTP, name this macroeconomic theory that is in sharp contrast to Keynesian economics.

Ans: SUPPLY SIDE ECONOMICS

Q7. Harlow Shapley was the first to discover their period - luminosity relation by studying the Magellanic clouds. All of these that have the same period have nearly the intrinsic brightness. FTP, identify these variable stars that brighten and dim in an extremely regular pattern and which were used by Shapley in determining the size and shape of the Milky Way.

Ans: CEPHEID VARIABLES

Q8. It lasted from 250 million to 290 million years ago. The Appalachians were formed then, and so was the supercontinent Pangaea. FTP, name this geological period, and the last of the Paleozoic Era.

Ans: PERMIAN period.

Q9. Islam makes no distinction between religion and life, and Islamic law covers all aspects of life. The codification of this law has its roots in Hadith, Ijma, Qiyas, and Ijtihad. FTP, what is this all encompassing Islamic law called?

Ans: SHARIA

Q10. South Africa and Swaziland are on the south, Zimbabwe, Zambia, and Malawi are on the west, and Tanzania is on the north. In recent years, this country has been torn between struggles of Frelimo and Renamo factions, and was further devastated by a terrible drought in 1992. FTP, name this country with its capital at Maputo.

Q13. He was one of the first to give the most comprehensive definition of the definite integral. The function named after him describes the distribution of prime numbers. FTP, name this German mathematician who laid the foundations of a non-Euclidean geometry and thus created the tools for Einstein's general theory of relativity.

Ans: Bernhard RIEMANN

Q14. High school football does not always guarantee success in life as proven by this player who scored 4 touchdowns in a single game for Polk High, but whose marriage to Ms. Wanker meant life as a perennial loser. FTP, identify this shoe-salesman.

Q15. Salman Rushdie is of course famous for Satanic Verses and the subsequent death "fatwa". He is not alone however, and recently this Bangladesh woman writer of the book "Lazza" joined his company, a book in which she reportedly questioned Koran, and subsequently had to fly from the country. FTP, identify this woman.

Q21. He threw himself into the Rhine and died later in a mental asylum. His works include "Papillons" and "Scenes of Child Hood". FTP, name this German composer, pianist and critic and husband of Clara Wieck.

Ans: ROBERT SCHUMANN

Q22. Originally called Radomyslsky, this Soviet communist leader was one of Lenin's closest collaborators. On Lenin's death, he formed a ruling triumvirate with Stalin and Kamenev and attacked Trotsky. But in a backstabbing move Stalin turned against him, and in 1935 he was imprisoned on the charges of Kirov's assassination. FTP, identify this leader, who along with Kamenev was executed in 1936.

Ans: Grigori ZINOVIEV

Q23. He wrote his best known work while living in a cork-lined room and working at night. He was born to rich French parents but after their deaths, lived a withdrawn life. FTP, identify this author whose "Swann's Way", and "Within a Budding Grove" were part of his cyclic novel "A Remembrance of Things Past".

Ans: Eugene Paul WIGNER

(c) This 1958 winner shared the prize with fellow Soviets I.M.Frank and I.V.Tamm for his discovery of radiation named after him. His research was responsible for forays into high energy physics and cosmic rays, as well as a nifty blue glow.

Ans: Pavel A. CHERENKOV
