TOSS-UPS

1. His early works were written under the pseudonym V. Sirin. "Pale Fire" is mock commentary on a poem supposedly written by a recently deceased American poet, which on another level becomes the confession of a mad king exiled from his country. For ten points, who was this author of "Bend Sinister", "Ada", and "Lolita"?

Vladimir _Nabokov_ [nah-BAW-kawv]

2. This baseball player was most famous for his work as a Yankees coach in the early 1960s. His innovations prompted Jim Bouton to call him "the greatest pitching coach ever". For ten points, name this pitcher who flourished during the late 40s as part of the "pray for rain" pitching combination with Warren Spahn.

Johnny _Sain_

3. A student of Antisthenes, this Greek philosopher lived during the 4th century BC and is credited with the development of the moral epigram. He believed in the ideal of self sufficiency and a life independent of luxury. FTP, name this famous cynic, said to have gone about Athens with a lantern in the daytime claiming to be looking for an honest man.

Diogenes of Sinope

4. This zoologist was murdered in 1985 at the Karisoke Research Center she founded in Rwanda in 1967. Encouraged in her work by anthropologist Louis Leakey, she began field studies of the rare mountain gorilla in east central Africa, studies she believed would provide insight into the practices of early humans. For ten points, who was this author of "Gorillas in the Mist"?

Dian _Fossey_

5. Much used during the 1980s in criminal and civil cases involving securities fraud and other white-collar crimes, its assets-seizure provision raised questions about possible civil rights violations. It allows for seizure of assets illegally gained or used at the time of indictment before a conviction has been received. For ten points, what was this act passed in 1970 to fight organized crime?

RICO Act (_Racketeer-Influenced and Corrupt Organizations_)

6. To prevent entry of foreign DNA, prokaryotic cells use these enzymes that cleave foreign DNA at certain specific sequences. This also makes these enzymes suitable tools for genetic identification tests, such as RFLP. For ten points, name this class of enzymes, which includes EcoR I [E-co-R one] and BamH III [Bam-H three].

restriction enzymes

7. During World War I, this leader joined the Jewish Legion and became a corporal during the final Middle Eastern campaigns of the war. He became an important figure of the Zionist labor movement in Palestine, and helped found the Histadrut and the Mapai Labor party. For ten points, who was this first prime minister of Israel?

David Ben-Gurion

8. This city was founded in 1900 as a French military post known as Fort Lamy [lah-MEE]; its colonial origins are reflected in its separate French and African quarters. The population of this agricultural trading center is half a million, and it lies near the eastern border of Cameroon, 85 miles south of Lake Chad. For ten points, name this city, Chad's capital.

N'Djamena [uhn-JAH-may-nah]

9. A pair of aliens, angered by Earth's "stupid minds", set up shop in a California cemetery. Their goal: to animate an army of the dead to march on world capitals. Trying to stop them is the intrepid Inspector Clay, portrayed by Swedish wrestler Tor Johnson. For ten points, name this movie written and directed by Ed Wood?

Plan 9 from Outer Space (or Graverobbers from Outer Space)

10. Early exponents of this style included Pontormo and Rosso Fiorentino. Dominant during the late Renaissance, it emphasized highly refined grace and elegance, in which display of individual virtuosity provoked intense rivalry between individual artists. For ten points, name this movement which derived its name from the Italian word for style

Mannerism

11. This English playwright wrote a 1981 autobiography entitled "A Better Class of Person". Though later works, like "Epitaph for George Dillon" and "Watch It Come Down", were less widely acclaimed than his early plays, this angry young man still established a loyal following with tense and dramatic works like "The Entertainer" and the historical "Luther". For ten points, who is this author of "Look Back In Anger"?

John Osborne

12. This 1979 play originally starred Blythe Danner as Emma, Roy Scheider as Robert, and Raul Julia as Jerry. The emotional impact of the lies used by Emma and Jerry to conceal their affair is exposed as the play runs backwards in time over a 7 year span. For ten points, what is this play by Harold Pinter?

Betrayal

13. 56-year-old Otis Gabriel still has his \$59,000 salary and corner office, but claims this organization has deprived him of his job title and placed him in a "phase-out position". Ironic, as Gabriel helped form this organization's age discrimination policies, and his employer is a leader in the fight against age bias. For ten points, what is this organization

which publishes "Modern Maturity"?

AARP (_American Association of Retired Persons_)

14. Introduced in 1963, this member of the benzodiazepine group of drugs is also known generically as diazepam. It is often used in treatment of acute alcohol withdrawal and of lower back pain, because it relieves spasms in skeletal muscle. For ten points, what is this widely prescribed minor tranquilizer?

Valium

15. This New York politician had little schooling, but had been admitted to the bar at age 23. He served as a US Representative until 1843, lost the 1844 election for governor of New York, and was the 1856 presidential candidate of the Know Nothing Party. For ten points, name this man, the 13th president of the US.

Millard _Fillmore_

16. The "Collier leaf", a sheet of paper believed to be in this playwright's handwriting, contains several fragments from his play "The Massacre at Paris", which survives only in a shortened, corrupted form. This University Wit was killed in a 1593 duel, but not before gaining acclaim on the English stage for works like "Edward II". For ten points, who was this dramatist, author of "Doctor Faustus"?

Christopher _Marlowe_

17. Currently 2,667 feet above sea level, its name is a corruption of the native name Rakata. In 1883, it produced a massive dust cloud, 120 foot high tidal waves, and an explosion heard 3,000 miles away. For ten points, what is this active volcano located in the Sunda Strait west of Java?

Krakatoa or _Krakatau_

18. This opera met hostile reception at its premiere on February 17, 1904, and withdrawn from production. The libretto by Luigi Illica and Giuseppe Giacosa, based on a story by John Luther Long, recounts the life and death of Cio-Cio-San and her marriage to an American naval officer. For ten points, what is this Puccini opera?

Madama Butterfly

19. Some innovations made to try to popularize this sport include allowing fans to watch from the sides of the playing area as well as behind and hiring cheerleaders to perform from the sidelines. Norm Duke and Walter Ray Williams are among its professional tour's top players. For ten points, what is this sport famous for its splits, turkeys, gutters, and strikes?

Bowling

20. After the decline of the Abbasid caliphate, these leaders established an empire centered

in Baghdad which included Iran, Iraq, and Syria. Their power was at its zenith during the reigns of Alp-arслан and Malik Shah, who with their vizier Nizam Al-Mulk, revived Sunni Islamic administrative and religious institutions. For ten points, name these nomadic Turkish warrior leaders from Central Asia.

Seljuks

21. After World War II, this filmmaker entered the State Film School at Lodz. His first feature film, "Knife in the Water", treated the subject of sexual tension, as did many of his later works, including "Cul-de-sac", "Repulsion", and "Bitter Moon". After the murder of his wife, Sharon Tate, he moved to France, but returned to the US to make "Chinatown". For ten points, who is this director of "Tess", "Frantic", and "Rosemary's Baby"?

Roman _Polanski_

22. Converted by her first husband, Robert, she joined him in revival campaigns. After his death, she remarried and opened Angelus Temple, headquarters of her "foursquare movement", built around the four roles of Christ as savior, baptizer, healer, and coming king. For ten points, name this flamboyant evangelist, known for her month-long disappearance in 1926?

Aimee Semple _McPherson_

23. This musician, born in Kansas City in 1929, composed film scores for "Promises, Promises" and "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid". He teamed with lyricist Hal David in 1957, and together they wrote "Walk On By" and "I'll Never Fall in Love Again" for Dionne Warwick. For ten points, who is this composer of "Raindrops Keep Falling On My Head"?

Burt _Bacharach_

24. Also known as Renmin Ribao, this publication's estimated circulation is over 6 million. Founded in 1948, this 6- to 8-page newspaper carries official reports but no editorials and uses only the New China News Agency as an international news service. For ten points, what is this chief newspaper of the Chinese Communist Party?

The _People's Daily_

25. This organization takes its name from an Italian phrase and has experienced a 30-year decline in power due to the defection and subsequent testimony of such members as Joseph Valachi and Sammy "the Bull" Gravano, leading to the conviction of John Gotti. For ten points, what organization, whose past crime bosses have included Al Capone, is the American version of the Italian mafia?

La _Cosa Nostra_ [prompt on "LCN"]

27. It gained full independence from Great Britain in 1984. Discovery of oil and natural gas gave this Islamic sultanate power far greater than its tiny area and population would indicate. Many people are immigrating there primarily near the oilfields in its western

corner near the South China Sea. For ten points, name this sultanate sandwiched between Malaysian Sarawak and Sabah on Borneo.

State of Brunei Dar-es-Salaam (Negara Brunei Dar-es-Salaam)

28. The year this architect won the Pritzker Prize, he completed the Sainsbury extension to London's National Gallery. Along with his wife, Denise Scott Brown, he designed unorthodox buildings which displayed his contempt for the International Style. For ten points, who is this leader of Postmodernism and author of "Complexity and Contradiction in American Architecture"?

Robert Venturi

29. Believed to be carriers of the strong nuclear force, these subatomic particles are theorized to exist in eight kinds, corresponding to the eight transformations that can change the colors of quarks. They can also bond with one another to form composite particles called glueballs. For ten points, what are these particles which bind together the quark constituents of protons and neutrons?

Gluons

30. Born circa 636 BC, this man gained renown as a military advisor and engineer, but is remembered today as a philosopher, though none of his writings are extant. His primary beliefs, such as the idea that the Earth floats on water, and that water is the basic element of existence, are known only through works attributed to him and his student Anaximander by later thinkers. For ten points, who was this first figure in the Milesian school of natural philosophy?
